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CONFERENCE PROVIDES NATIONAL PERSPECTIVE FOR LOCAL AGING AND DISABILITY PROFESSIONALS

HONOLULU - The State Executive Office on Aging (EOA) in partnership with the National Association of States United for Aging and Disabilities (NASUAD) is hosting the 2013 Hawaii HCBS (Home & Community-Based Services) Conference in Honolulu from Dec. 3 to 5, 2013, at the Hyatt Regency Waikiki Beach Hotel. The conference will give a national perspective for local aging and disability professionals and will feature the latest trends and innovations in the field. Participants will include federal, state and local policymakers and those who administer, manage and deliver waiver and other HCBS programs. Attendees will hear from leaders from the U.S. Health and Human Services Administration, National Association of States United for Aging and Disabilities, National Association of Area Agencies on Aging, National Council of Independent Living, and many others on national trends and innovations in aging and disability programs.

“Hawaii’s aging and disability networks are experiencing tremendous change in the way we plan for and deliver long-term supports and services in home and community-based settings,” said Wesley Lum, EOA executive director. “Business, operational, and service delivery models that have worked for us in the past are now being challenged, and these models may no longer be relevant in light of new federal and state policy

directions. This conference will provide the perspective needed for us, as a unified network, to move forward together in creating a strong home and community-based services system for Hawaii.”
