

# What Is Comprehensive Cancer Control?

Comprehensive Cancer Control (CCC) is an approach that brings together key partners and organizations to develop a plan to reduce the number of community members who get or die from cancer. The CCC plan focuses on cancers that cause the most burden in the community, and uses methods that have worked in similar communities to prevent and control these cancers.

The Hawai'i State Cancer Plan 2016-2020 was created by the Hawai'i Comprehensive Cancer (HCC) Coalition, a group of diverse, focused, and compassionate individuals, community partnerships, and organizations that are dedicated to saving the lives and improving the quality of life for those impacted by cancer in Hawai'i. The cancer plan uses information gathered from public health data. This information includes number of cancer cases, deaths, risks for cancer, and healthy behaviors that can prevent cancer. The plan includes activities that—

- Encourage people to make healthy choices.
- Educate people about cancer screening.
- Increase access to good cancer care and reduce health disparities.
- Make sure people who survive cancer live well.

#### Mission:

Bringing people together to help coordinate cancer prevention, early detection, equitable access to care, and ongoing research efforts to improve the quality of life for all residents of Hawai'i.

#### Goals:

- Prevent cancers by reducing exposure to known risk factors.
- Increase the proportion of cancer detected at early stages through screening.
- Provide all Hawai'i residents, including the most vulnerable and the medically underinsured populations, access to state-of-the-art cancer prevention, screening, and treatment.
- Improve the quality of life for survivors and loved-ones battling the effects of cancer.
