
SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DIRECTOR OF HEALTH TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO DETERMINE A MEANS FOR A CHILD TO BE SCREENED PRIOR TO THE START OF THE CHILD'S EDUCATION, AT THE CHILD'S FIRST ENTRY INTO PRESCHOOL AND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, TO PROVIDE FOR DIAGNOSIS, REFERRAL, CORRECTION OR TREATMENT, AND TO INTEGRATE THE EFFORTS OF COMMUNITY AND STATE ORGANIZATIONS RELATED TO SCREENING UNDER THIS HAWAII CHILDHOOD SCREENING INITIATIVE.

1 WHEREAS, recent neuroscience research demonstrates that a
2 child's early years are the most crucial in the child's
3 cognitive, emotional, social, and physical development; and
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5 WHEREAS, there are tremendous opportunities for preventive
6 work with children and families as well as predictable, costly
7 consequences for not doing so; and
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9 WHEREAS, quality early childhood education and child care
10 that support all aspects of early development are crucial to
11 ensuring that every child starts his or her formal education
12 healthy, safe, and ready to learn and succeed; and
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14 WHEREAS, this goal can be achieved by assuring that each
15 child can hear, see, and speak at a minimum level prior to
16 starting school; and
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18 WHEREAS, early screening, identification, and intervention
19 for developmental delays and psychosocial problems improve
20 children's outcomes and have a critical influence on school
21 success and family functioning; and
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23 WHEREAS, the ideal is to provide each child with ongoing
24 access to quality primary health care and, to the greatest
25 extent possible, a safe home and community environment; and



1 WHEREAS, it is in the State's interest to provide
2 developmental screening and assessment that will detect
3 deficiencies and provide corrections before they hinder a
4 child's ability to function in school; and

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6 WHEREAS, the departments of Health, Education, and Human
7 Services currently provide families access to various community
8 health services; and

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10 WHEREAS, parents are often unaware of or choose not to
11 avail themselves of these services so their children do not
12 receive proper screening, evaluation, and referrals for
13 correction or treatment; now, therefore,

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15 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-third
16 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2006, the
17 House of Representatives concurring, that the Director of Health
18 is requested to convene a task force to determine a means for a
19 child to be screened prior to the start of the child's
20 education, at the child's first entry into preschool and
21 elementary school, to provide for diagnosis, referral,
22 correction or treatment, and to integrate the efforts of
23 community and state organizations related to screening under
24 this Hawaii childhood screening initiative; and

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26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of Health involve
27 representatives of all relevant agencies and organizations, both
28 public and private, in the development of the task force; and

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30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the purpose of the task force
31 is to:

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33 (1) Plan and implement a statewide screening initiative
34 for all children from birth to eight years of age;
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36 (2) Develop and implement a screening certification
37 program for children entering preschool and elementary
38 school; and

41 January 1, 2007;

38 serve without compensation but be reimbursed for necessary
39 expenses, including travel expenses, incurred in the performance

1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to:

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- 3 (1) Recommend selection of standardized developmental
- 4 screening tools for children from birth through age
- 5 eight years of age, including but not limited to:
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- 7 (A) Cognitive development;
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- 9 (B) Language development;
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- 11 (C) Motor development;
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- 13 (D) Adaptive skills;
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- 15 (E) Behavioral or social-emotional development;
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- 17 (F) Hearing; and
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- 19 (G) Vision;
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- 21 (2) Formalize referral protocols;
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- 23 (3) Develop guidelines for reporting the completion of a
- 24 child's screening requirement for children entering
- 25 preschool or elementary school;
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- 27 (4) Address issues related to physician participation; and
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- 29 (5) Evaluate compliance and appropriateness of referrals;

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33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to

34 submit to the Legislature an annual report no later than 20 days

35 before the start of each regular session, beginning with the

36 Regular Session of 2007, on any recommended legislation

37 necessary to implement the program; and
