Uncle will call for free help and advice.**



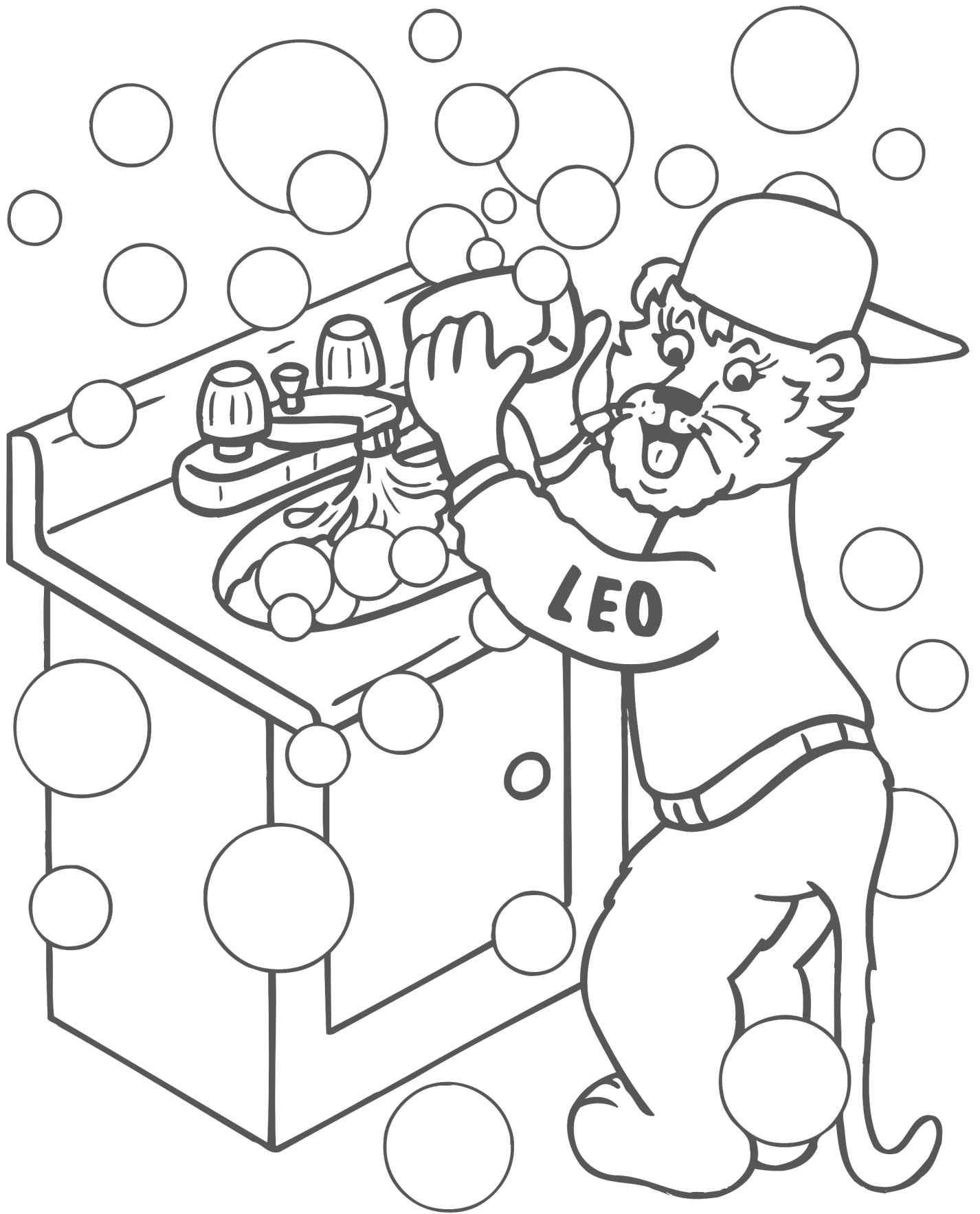
**Dirt near buildings and busy roads might have lead in it.

He always cleans up before coming home.**



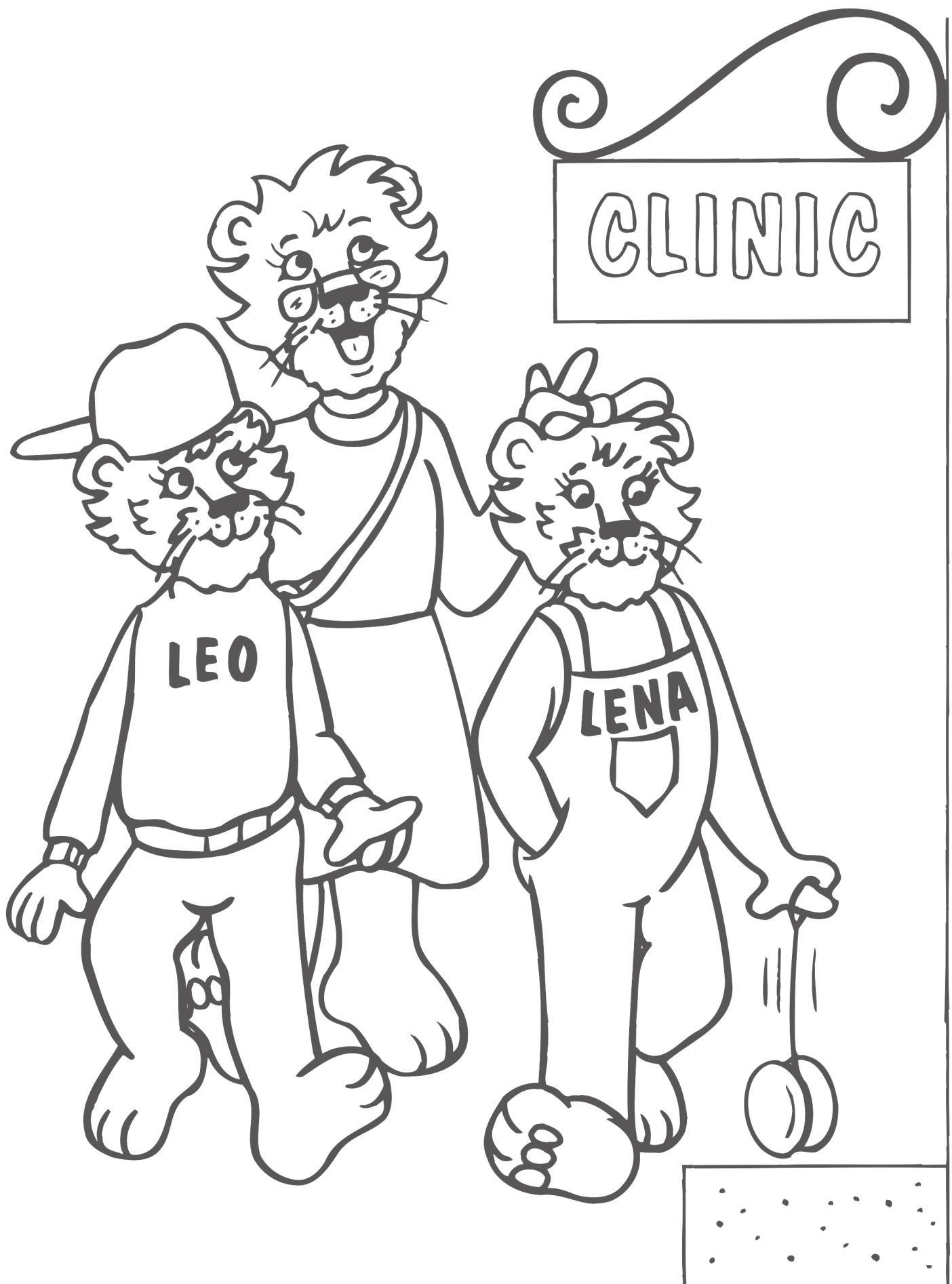
**I'm washing my hands to get rid of any lead.

Keep it clean



Wash hands often



Clean toys and teethingers often



Use a HEPA vacuum, wet mop, and wet paper towels



Don't sweep



Keep shoes outside

Toys made after 2012



No fishing sinkers



No jewelry



No antiques



No souvenirs

Where to play



Grassy areas



Away from busy roads



Away from dirt



Away from chipping paint

Food and drinks



Regular meals with lots of calcium, iron, and vitamin C



Don't use hot water tap for cooking, drinking, or formula



Don't use old, antique, or worn out dishes



Don't use food, spices, or medicine with foreign labels

Work and hobbies



Shower and change before coming home if you work with lead



Wash work clothes separately with extra rinse cycle



Store work and hobby supplies out of reach



Don't melt lead near where kids live or play

Test your  home for lead paint
