

Hence HD2 2 and SB 608 SD1, Relating to Prescription Drugs in quality that the provide accessible prescription drug label information to dividuals who have difficulty seeing or reading prescription drug container label and inform the public that prescription drug label information is available in alternate accessible formats for individuals who have difficulty seeing or reading prescription drug container labels. Requires the Board of narmacy to adopt certain rules by December 31, 2023.

HB 388 HD1 SD2, Relating to Education

Adopts the National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard. Requires the department of education to obtain instructional materials in accessible formats for eligible students.

HB 716, Relating to Elections

Requires the office of elections to prepare a voter information guide that includes candidate statements and statements on ballot questions. Appropriates funds to the department of the attorney general, legislative

reference bureau, and counties for the preparation of the ballot analyses. Appropriates funds to the office of elections for the preparation and distribution of the voter information guides. Measure deferred on February 8, 2023.

HB 818 and SB 609 SD1, Relating to Hearing Aids

Requires health insurance policies and contracts issued on or after 01/01/2024 to provide coverage for the cost of hearing aids at a minimum of \$1,500 per hearing aid for each hearing-impaired ear every thirty-six months. Effective 01/01/2024.

<u>HB 830, Relating to the Hawaii School for the Deaf and Blin</u>. Requires the Department of Education to meet with Hawain shool for the Deaf and Blind stakeholders and members of the Hawai'i des community regarding the development of a plan to transition the Hawai'i School for the Deaf and Blind to a conversion charter school. Registrate a report to the Legislature.

Measured deferred on February 14, 2023.

<u>HB 834 HD1 SD1 and SB 610, Relating to American Sign Language</u> Recognizes American Sign Language as a fully coveloped, autonomous, natural language with its own gramma coverage vocabulary, and cultural heritage.

HB 933 HD2 SD1 and SB 61 melating to Telecommunications Access for Individuals with Print Proabilities

Requires the Public filities Commission to use Universal Service Fund moneys to provide finitelecommunications access to certain information for individuals with rint to bilities.

HB 935 2015P.60. 02, Relating to Hearing Aids

Exempts, provide ral excise tax, gross receipts received from the sale of hearing aid

P1 and SB 1219, Relating to Public Safety



For up as and appropriates moneys for the provision of free voice communication services in the State's youth and adult correctional facilities. Prompits state agencies from deriving revenue or financial benefits from the provision of communication services to persons confined in state correctional incilities. Appropriates funds for the Hawai'i state automated victim information and notification program. (HD1)

HB 935, Measure deferred on February 15, 2023. SB 1219, referred to PSM/CPN, WAM/JDC.

SB 8, Relating to Administrative Rules

Requires all state agencies adopting, amending, or repealing a rule to make the full text of the rules of the agency available on the website of the Office of the Lieutenant Governor in a digitally accessible and searchable format. Measure deferred on February 2, 2023.

SB 108, Relating to Access to Instructional Materials

Adopts the National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard for use by the Department of Education in preparation of instructional materials for eligible students. Defines "eligible student" in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the Copyright Act. Requires the Department of Education to obtain instructional materials in accessible formats whenever available from the publisher or the National Instructional Materials Access Center when materials are not available from the publisher in the appropriate, accessible format needed by an eligible student. Requires instructional materials to be sufficient for grade level progress ele assistive students. Requires the Department of Education to provid technology devices and services for eligible students. Res requi ments for publishers to provide computer diskettes conforming to A Standard Code for Information Interchange.

SB 607, Relating to Access to Instructional Materials

ccessibility Adopts the National Instructional Materials indard for the eligible students in a timely purposes of providing instructional materials manner and requires the Department of Educa t coordinate with the National Instructional Materials Aco Center. A morizes the Department to assist non-public elementary and sec ary solo and alternative g access educational program in obtain structional materials. Requires all elementary schools, sec ary chools, and alternative educational nts with accessible instructional stive technology services at the same programs to provide eligible s assistive technology d nces, an materials an provided to other students. time print instruction

SB 814 SD2 H R Report Electronic Information Technology Accessibility for Persons with miteo English Proficiency

Requires an Office of Enterprise Technology Services, in consultation with the Office of Lange of Access and a working group composed of stakeholde to develop and publish, and periodically review and update, electronic information technology multilingual accessibility standards to be to be all state entities.

9 and SB 813 SD1 HD2, Relating to Court Interpreters

expres the Judiciary to increase the hourly fees, mileage reimbursement e, and commuter-time compensation rate for court interpreters. opropriates funds.

Address Shortage of American Sign Language (ASL) Interpreters in Hawaii HCR 186 HD1, HR 191 HD1, SCR 32 SD1, SR 26 SD1, Requesting the Disability and Communication Access Board to Establish an American Sign Language Interpreter Workforce Working Group to Promote Increasing the Number of American Sign Language Interpreters in the State

Requires the Disability and Communication Access Board to serve as chairperson of the working group that consists of a representative from the Department of Education, Department of Human Services Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Member of Deaf and Blind Task Force, Professor from the University of Hawaii who teaches ASL, Senator selected by the President of the Senate, Representative selected by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, Individual who currently serves as an ASL interpreter and additional representatives invited by the DCAB.

The working group with administrative assistance of the Department of Health is requested to submit an interim report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2024 and a final report no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of the Regular Sector of 2026. The working group to be dissolved on June 30, 2026.
