Test your vaccine knowledge.

Question:

A child without a documented history of chickenpox, but who has had physician diagnosed shingles, should receive a varicella vaccination series. True or False?

Answer: False

Shingles, a painful vesicular rash typically appearing in a dermatomal distribution of one or two sensory-nerve roots, is caused by the reactivation of the varicella-zoster virus (VZV), the same virus that causes chickenpox. A diagnosis of herpes zoster by a healthcare provider is considered by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) to meet criteria for evidence of immunity to varicella. A child with physician diagnosed shingles does not need a varicella vaccination series.
