VACCINE POINTS

"Vaccine Points" is a bi-monthly communication distributed by the Hawaii Department of Health to all participating Vaccines for Children (VFC) providers.

Question: A 14-month old child received an influenza vaccine in May 2020 (at age 9 months). How many doses of influenza vaccine, if any, does this child need now?

- a) 0 doses already received flu vaccine this year
- b) 1 dose now
- c) 2 doses one now and one 4 weeks after the first dose
- d) Unable to determine would depend on the type of vaccine child received in May 2020.

Answer:

2 doses - one now and one 4 weeks after the first dose c)


Children aged 6 months through 8 years require 2 doses of influenza vaccine administered a minimum of 4 weeks apart during their first season of vaccination for optimal protection. Determination of the number of doses needed is based on:

1) the child's age at the time of the first dose of 2020–21 influenza vaccine and

2) the number of doses of influenza vaccine received in previous influenza seasons

For those aged 6 months through 8 years, the number of doses of influenza vaccine needed for the 2020–21 influenza season is determined as follows:

- Those who have previously received ≥ 2 total doses of trivalent or quadrivalent influenza vaccine \geq 4 weeks apart before July 1, 2020, require only 1 dose for the 2020–21 season. The 2 previous doses of influenza vaccine do not need to have been administered in the same season or consecutive seasons.
- Those who have not previously received ≥ 2 doses of trivalent or quadrivalent influenza vaccine \geq 4 weeks apart before July 1, 2020, or whose previous influenza vaccination history is unknown, require 2 doses for the 2020–21 season. The interval between the 2 doses should be ≥4 weeks. Two doses are recommended even if the child turns age 9 years between receipt of dose 1 and dose 2.
