Draft DOH Proposed Governors Legislative Package

§321-221 to §321-237 Modernization and update Hawaii Revised Statutes, Part XVIII, to align with current Emergency Medical Services national clinical, licensure, industry standards, and scope of practice frameworks.



New Business Legislative Update: 13 Measures

Measure	Measure Title	Description
HB1535	RELATING TO AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATORS.	Establishes an income tax credit for the purchase and installation of automated external defibrillator devices by certain places of public accommodation.
HB1577	RELATING TO 911 SERVICES.	Requires the 911 Board to establish, implement, and maintain a statewide emergency safety profile system that allows residents to voluntarily create and manage secure personal profiles containing information relevant to emergency responses.
HB1708	RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY.	Specifies that operating a vehicle under the influence of an intoxicant while a highly intoxicated driver is a class C felony and outlines additional requirements for probation.
SB2011	RELATING TO THE COUNTIES.	Requires each county to adopt display standards requiring visible and readable street addresses and to require owners of residential and commercial buildings to post street addresses in accordance with the county's display standards.
SB2136	RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.	Establishes safe riding behaviors for electric bicycles. Prohibits the operation of high-speed electric devices in certain locations. Establishes labeling and signage requirements for electric bicycles. Prohibits the operation of a moped or electric motorcycle in certain locations. Amends the definition of "bicycle" for purposes of county vehicular taxes. Defines "electric bicycle" in place of "low-speed electric bicycle". Defines "electric micro-mobility device" and requires the same regulations as electric foot scooters to apply to electric micro-mobility devices. Prohibits a person under the age of sixteen from operating a class 3 electric bicycle. Authorizes a person under the age of fourteen to operate class 2 electric bicycles under supervision. Prohibits a person from riding a class 3 electric bicycle on a sidewalk. Authorizes a person to ride a class 1 or class 2 electric bicycle on a sidewalk under certain circumstances. Prohibits a person from operating a bicycle or electric foot scooter under the age of eighteen without a helmet. Repeals the requirement that moped drivers use bicycle lanes. Substitutes the word "motor-driven cycle" with the word "motor scooter".
SB2146	RELATING TO TRAFFIC INFRACTIONS.	Establishes a Traffic Fines Task Force that will examine the Finnish tiered traffic fines system, determine whether a similar system could be implemented in the State, and provide recommendations as to how a system could best be implemented. Appropriates funds.
SB2226	RELATING TO MOTORCYCLES.	Requires all persons operating or riding a motorcycle to wear a safety helmet.
SB2267	RELATING TO 911 SERVICES.	Requires the 911 Board to establish, implement, and maintain a statewide emergency safety profile system that allows residents to voluntarily create and manage secure personal profiles containing information relevant to emergency responses.
SB2392	RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY.	Specifies that operating a vehicle under the influence of an intoxicant while a highly intoxicated driver is a class C felony and outlines additional requirements for probation.
SB2463	RELATING TO THE USE OF INTOXICANTS WHILE OPERATING A VEHICLE.	Lowens the blood alcohol content threshold for driving while under the influence of an intoxicant.
SB2504	RELATING TO GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION.	Appropriates funds to the Judiciary for the enforcement of gun violence protective orders. Appropriates funds to the Department of Law Enforcement to conduct public awareness campaigns on gun violence protective orders.
SB2505	RELATING TO OPIOID USE DISORDER TREATMENT.	Authorizes licensed paramedics to administer buprenorphine after administration of an opioid antagonist in cases of opioid overdoses, under certain conditions. Requires the Department of Health to implement a phased pilot program in at least 1 county with verified linkage-to-care capacity and authorizes expansion of the program statewide as additional treatment resources become available. Requires a report to the Legislature evaluating program outcomes.
SB2521	RELATING TO EMERGENCY SERVICES.	Exempts emergency medical services personnel from commercial driver's license requirements. Amends the definition of "authorized emergency vehicle" under State Traffic Code to replace ambulances with emergency medical services vehicles.

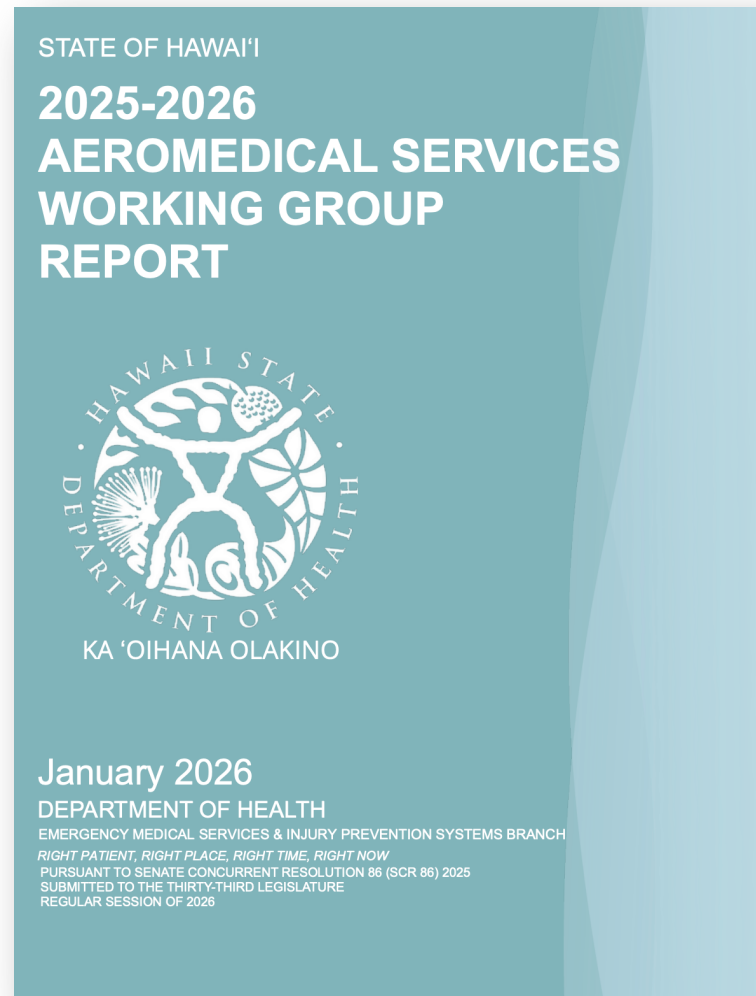

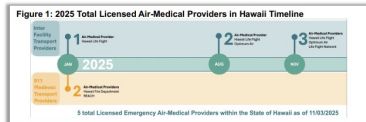

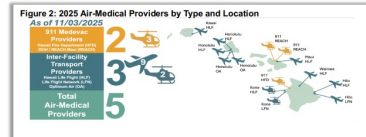

V. Overview Hawai'i Aeromedical / Air-Medical Landscape

Historically, Hawai'i's civilian emergency air-medical transport system was predominantly served by a single provider. For more than three decades, Hawai'i Life Flight, including its predecessor air ambulance operations, functioned as the principal civilian emergency and interfacility transport (IFT) air-medical inter-island transport provider in the state. Following the closure of other civilian air ambulance operators, including LifeSave KuPono in 2022, and Air Methods, Hawai'i Life Flight remained the sole major civilian air-medical provider supporting critical interfacility transport statewide.^{1,4}

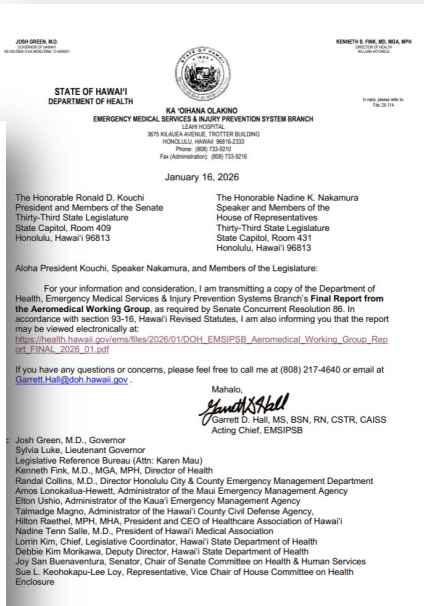


However, over the past year, Hawai'i's air-medical landscape has rapidly expanded. As of November 3, 2025, there are now three (3) IFT air-medical transport providers operating in the State: Hawai'i Life Flight (HLF), Optimum Air, and Life Flight Network (LFN), reflecting increased demand for air-medical services and a diversification of available system resources. 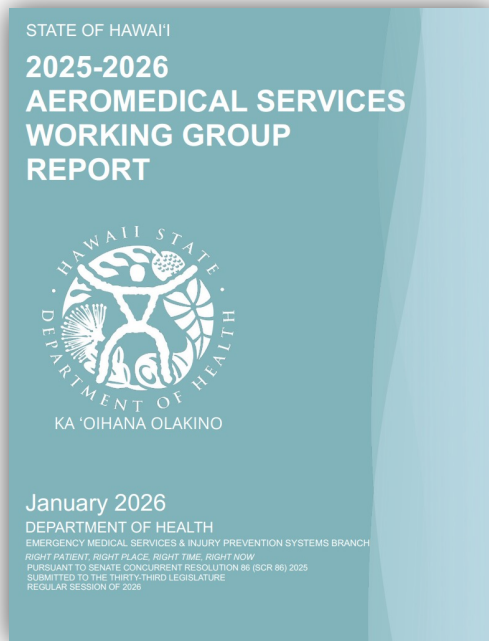

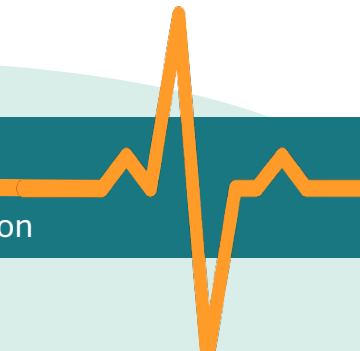
Priority Recommendations (Pages 6-7):

To advance these recommendations, the Working Group requests that the Legislature:

- Appropriate recurring funds and establish permanent Department of Health EMS aeromedical staffing in Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS).
- Authorize statutory modernization of HRS Chapter 321 to support statewide aeromedical coordination and governance.
- Support planning and phased implementation of a statewide Medical Communications (MEDICOM) Center, including integration with rural healthcare transformation efforts.
- Sustain funding for the unified statewide EMS and aeromedical data infrastructure.

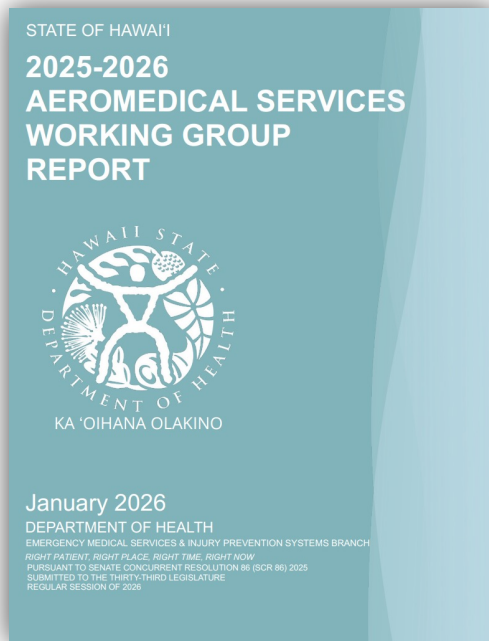

Immediate Legislative Actions (Page 7):

1. **Establish permanent, dedicated aeromedical staffing within the Department of Health EMS Section** to support statewide coordination, oversight, quality improvement, and disaster readiness.
2. **Support the Modernize Hawai'i Revised Statutes §321-221 through §321- 237** to reflect modern aeromedical operations and clarify statewide authority and accountability.
3. **Establish a centralized, scalable statewide Medical Communications (MEDICOM) Center** to coordinate emergency and interfacility aeromedical transport as part of Rural Healthcare Transformation Program.
4. **Sustain and expand a unified statewide EMS aeromedical data and communications platform** to support real-time situational awareness, performance monitoring, and system accountability.
5. **Adopt nationally recognized accreditation frameworks** to strengthen clinical, safety, and operational standards without duplicative or overly prescriptive regulation.

Scene Time: Arrival on Scene to Departure with Patient

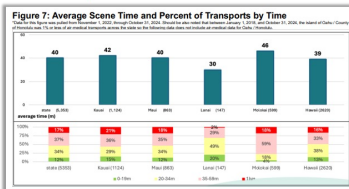
Scene time is defined as the interval from an aeromedical aircraft's arrival on scene, whether at an incident location, hospital, or designated rendezvous point, which includes time aeromedical crew arrival at patient, to departure time with the patient. This measure is a critical operational KPI reflecting on-scene clinical care, patient assessment and stabilization, patient packaging, and coordination with ground responders.

Analysis of statewide aeromedical transport data from November 2022 through October 2024 demonstrates the following (see Figure 7):

- The statewide average scene time was 40 minutes.
- Average scene times varied across islands, ranging from 30 minutes on Lānaʻi to 46 minutes on Molokai, with Kauaʻi (42 minutes), Maui (40 minutes), and Hawaiʻi Island (39 minutes) aligning closely with the statewide average.

Only 12 percent of statewide transports achieved a scene time of less than 20 minutes, while:

- 37 percent occurred within 20-34 minutes
- 37 percent required 35-59 minutes
- 17 percent exceeded one hour on scene

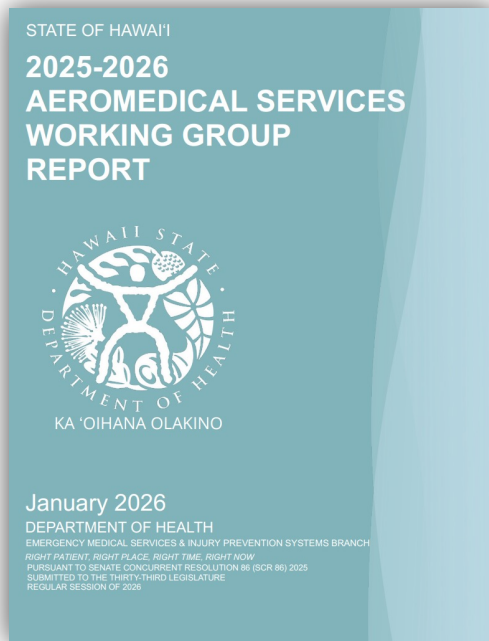

Immediate Legislative Actions (Page 46):

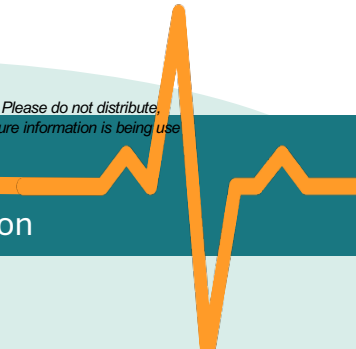
The Working Group respectfully urges the Legislature to take immediate action to:

2. Support Modernize HRS Chapter 321 (§321-221–237) to clarify authority and accountability for emergency and interfacility aeromedical coordination; and
3. Support implementation of a statewide MEDICOM Center through the Rural Healthcare Transformation Program and sustain the unified EMS data infrastructure.

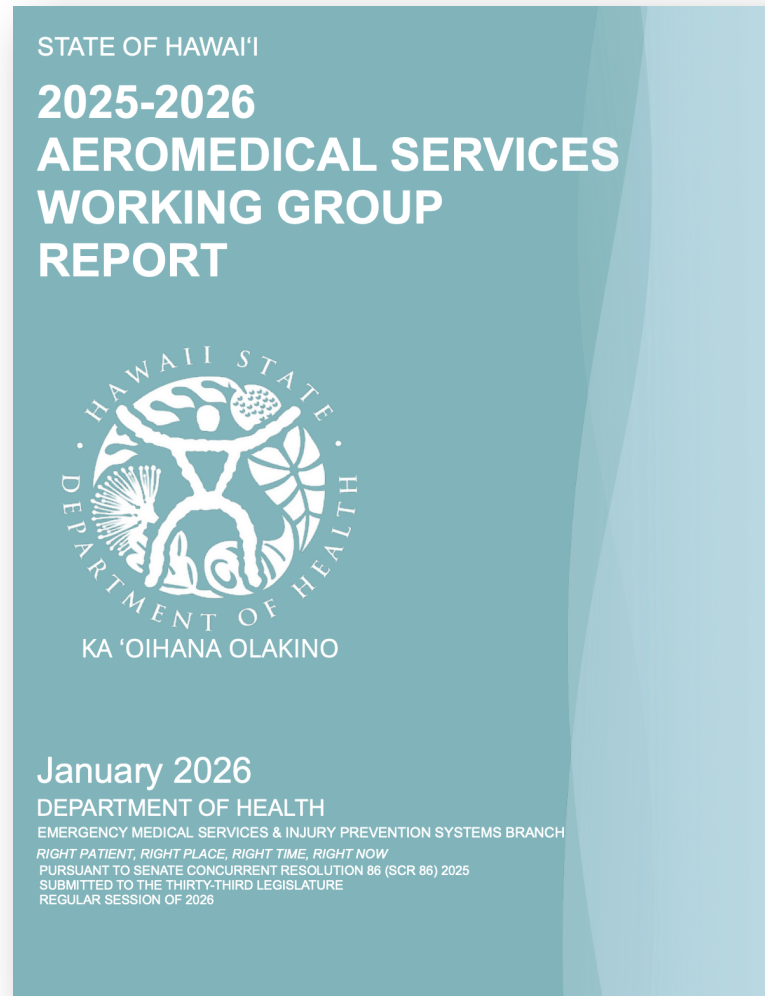

Modernization EMS Statutes to support Emergency Medical Systems of Care

Purpose: To update Hawaii's legislative statutes for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) to align with national standards and transition from a fragmented, siloed approach to an integrated, comprehensive Emergency Medical System of Care. This modernization is essential to improve coordination, enhance patient outcomes, ensure equitable access to emergency medical resources statewide, and establish a more resilient and efficient emergency response infrastructure for all of Hawaii's communities.



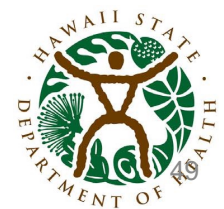
State MEDICOM Center / Emergency & Trauma Transfer Center

Purpose: The purpose of this initiative is to ensure timely and appropriate emergency and acute care across Hawaii, specifically addressing the unique needs of rural island communities. By coordinating comprehensive emergency care navigation and streamlining transfers for emergency and acute care patients, this strategy aims to significantly enhance emergency response times, shorten the interval to definitive medical treatment, and reduce preventable disabilities and deaths. Additionally, this approach presents substantial cost-saving potential, as evidenced by a similar initiative in Arkansas, where strategic investments resulted in annual savings exceeding \$120 million. These savings were primarily achieved through the reduction of unnecessary double transfers, minimized Medicare and Medicaid billing errors, and improved patient survival rates. Furthermore, this initiative ensures a more prepared Hawaii by providing 24/7 visibility on EMS and air medical resources. It also lays the groundwork for establishing a Medical Operations Command Center during disasters and supports syndromic surveillance capabilities to enhance public health preparedness and response.



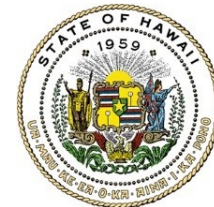
Updating Regulatory Process for Billing

Purpose: Establish dedicated funding for the State EMS Clinical Documentation Integrity Team to improve clinical documentation accuracy, resulting in increased revenues for Hawaii's general fund. Implement robust regulatory oversight, including rigorous validation and auditing of EMS clinical data, to enhance financial transparency and accountability. Additionally, update payment processing systems to accurately account for credit card fees, and ensure that financial incentives and tax-related write-offs exclusively benefit Hawaii residents, safeguarding the responsible and effective use of taxpayer dollars.

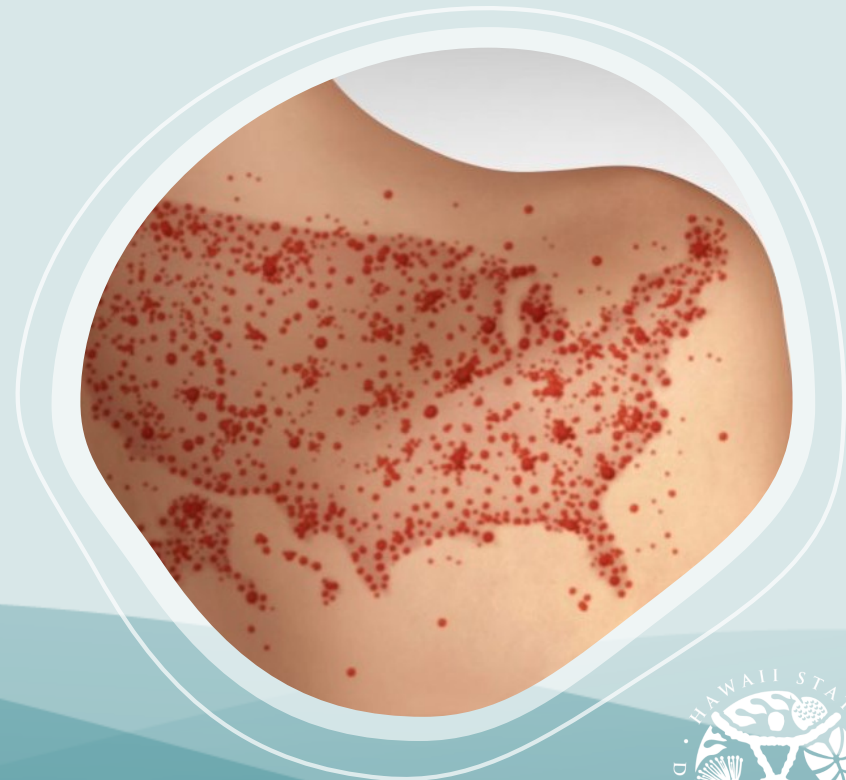

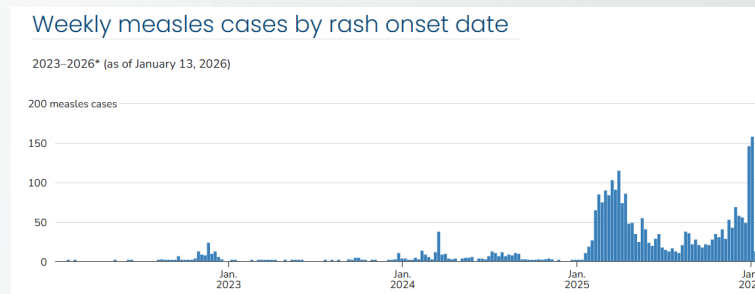

Measles Refresher

- Fever and rash illness caused by the measles virus
- Measles virus is extremely contagious among non-immune persons
 - Up to 90% of unvaccinated, non-immune persons in close contact will become infected
 - Airborne transmission for up to 2 hours in a shared indoor space
- Complications include hearing loss, pneumonia, severe diarrhea, encephalitis, sub-acute sclerosing panencephalitis (SSPE) later in life, and death
- Highly effective vaccine prevents illness and transmission
- Increasing unvaccinated population size in the U.S. contributing to ongoing outbreaks and increased likelihood of local outbreaks

Measles Cases & Outbreaks

- Currently, there are no measles outbreaks ongoing in Hawai'i. In 2025, Hawai'i DOH identified and responded to 2 travel-associated confirmed measles cases on O'ahu.
- DOH reported measles detection in wastewater samples in West Hawai'i County (8/2025), Kaua'i County (10/2025), and Maui County (11/2025).
- In 2025, CDC reports 2,242 confirmed measles cases nationally from 45 states and 3 deaths.
 - 89% of cases were associated with 49 domestic outbreaks, an increase from 16 outbreaks in 2024.
 - 11% of cases were hospitalized
- Currently, large measles outbreaks are ongoing in South Carolina and Utah.
- Expected that the United States will lose its measles elimination status, similar to Canada.

Hawai'i is at risk for measles outbreaks

- Measles virus is currently circulating in the United States and international destinations linked by travel.
- Hawai'i kindergarten MMR vaccine coverage for 2024-25 = 89.9% (US National = 92.5%) which is below the goal 95% threshold to prevent outbreaks.
- Increased risk for measles outbreaks in neighbor islands due to lower vaccination coverage.
 - Religious vaccine exemptions among K-12 students:
 - Kaua'i County = 9.5%
 - Hawai'i County = 9.1%
 - Maui County = 6.8%
 - Honolulu County = 4.1%
 - 24 schools reported having more than half of students not meeting required vaccination milestones
- Closing the vaccination coverage gap will decrease outbreak risk.

HONOLULU — The health and safety of Hawai'i residents are a top priority as measles cases continue to rise in the United States and internationally. Despite the success of vaccines in preventing diseases, the highly contagious viral illness is returning after being declared eliminated in the United States in 2000.

Two doses of the MMR vaccine are 97% effective in preventing infection and stopping the spread. Measles was once eliminated in the U.S., but low vaccination rates are bringing it back. 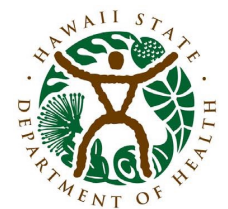
