- 1) Larry Lau called the meeting to order at approximately 9:10am.
 - 1.1 Opening remarks by Larry Lau. HEER office as well as the Radiation Branch are readying for the NIMS compliance in order to receive some funding. Larry also mentioned that approval was given to fill the vacancy for the HEPCRA/HSERC coordinator position.
 - 1.2 Larry asked that the minutes be checked. He made a motion to accept the minutes from meeting #56 but Carter requested the minutes be amended, (2.4 Oahu, Leland Nakai gave the presentation, not Carter), Warren Chung also asked for an amendment to the minutes, (5) HMEP Training Classes and Exercises, wording changed from, their "HazMat Refresher training" to "HazMat Technician Training"). After corrections were made, a motion was set to accept the amended minutes and it was then seconded (Carter/Bowen).
 - 1.3 Attendees introduced themselves.

2) Local Planning Committee (LEPC) Updates

2.1 Hawaii

John Bowen: 1) On Sunday, July 4, 2005 at 1:15p.m, there was a fuel barge fire, a potential for disaster. 1.1 million gallons were involved. A pump malfunction occurred and fire started on the deck. There were no crewmembers on board. There were no written emergency procedures (plans) to be found but later plans were discovered but had never been used before this incident. LEPC and the Fire Department are now working with the company. 2) 2 LEPC members were sent to the HazMat Explo Conference in Las Vegas. 3) Development of a library system containing conference materials is a work in progress (conference information is in storage at the present). 4) Hawaii State Fire Council (HSFC) will be offering an eight hour Tech level training course but it will only be classroom taught, without hands-on experience (this does not satisfy 29 CFR requirements). John suggested that the HSERC committee send an official letter asking the Fire Departments for a redefinition of what the requirements are. Winston Lum is the head of the HSFC. Carter offered to speak with him on the matter and plans to get back to Larry on it. Meanwhile, John will draft a letter stating that the course that will be taught does not meet the criteria. 5) Mike Cripps- Curtis Martin responded to the barge incident but felt they didn't know how to handle the chemical (Naphtha). Larry-by the next HSERC meeting, further reporting will be needed on this. Mike-should deal with it like a gas.

2.2 Kauai

Clifford Ikeda: 1) There is a possibility of hosting a HazMat course but what is expected of the hosting county regarding props and equipment? Without knowing what is expected of the hosting count, If Kauai County has to provide these things then they cannot make a commitment at this time. 2) Attended the HazMat Explo Conference in Las Vegas. 3) We are currently updating our plans. 4) There will be a full-scale exercise in April 2005.

2.3 Maui

Scott Kekuewa: 1) 1st quarter LEPC meeting was held on December 15, 2004 (Agenda Attached). Discussed the HMEP project (sharing information with the contractor), Operating budget, etc,.

2.4 Oahu

Carter Davis: 1) LEPC meeting was held on December 9, 2004 (Honolulu LEPC meeting agenda and minutes attached). 2) PowerPoint presentation of Paul Dixon's Airport Project (Handout). 3) Waiwai Loop Area-a particular fireworks company keeps moving around. They were accidentally discovered again while scoping and surveying the area (Airport project). Tom Smyth: There is a problem with fireworks being in close proximity with other hazardous substances. Carter: It's a zoning issue. There is no violation in the fire code as long as they manage it properly. 4) NASTTPO highlights (LEPC meeting minutes). 5) Kakaako-there is a new facility (APIC) conducting business in integrated circuit chip research and development (not a chip manufacturer). There are all sorts of exotic chemical substances being used. 6) On December 1, 2004, a tabletop was held at the Main

Re: Hazmat Technician Training

The Hawaii State Emergency Response Commission (HSERC) shares a vital interest with you in having properly trained people on duty, and we take this opportunity to remind you of the prerequisites for certifying Hazardous Materials Technicians in our State. We all want to make sure that the right training courses are used so that we achieve objectives assuring that operations can be conducted well and that public money is well spent.

The HIOSH/OSHA standards (HRS Title, chapter 99, and 29 CFR 1910.120, both popularly known as the HAZWOPER Standard) detail the precise competencies that a responder must demonstrate to be certified as a Hazmat Technician. The applicable portion of the HAZWOPER Standard reads as follows:

Hazardous materials technician. Hazardous materials technicians are individuals who respond to releases or potential releases for the purpose of stopping the release. They assume a more aggressive role than a first responder at the operations level in that they will approach the point of release in order to plug, patch or otherwise stop the release of a hazardous substance. Hazardous materials technicians shall have received at least 24 hours of training equal to the first responder operations level and in addition have competency in the following areas and the employer shall so certify:

- (A) Know how to implement the employer's emergency response plan.
- (B) Know the classification, identification and verification of known and unknown materials by using field survey instruments and equipment.
- (C) Be able to function within an assigned role in the Incident Command System.
- (D) Know how to select and use proper specialized chemical personal protective equipment provided to the hazardous materials technician.
 - (E) Understand hazard and risk assessment techniques.
- (F) Be able to perform advance control, containment, and/or confinement operations within the capabilities of the resources and personal protective equipment available with the unit.
 - (G) Understand and implement decontamination procedures.
 - (H) Understand termination procedures.
 - (I) Understand basic chemical and toxicological terminology and behavior.

Note that this Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response (HAZWOPER) standard places heavy emphasis on physical demonstration of one's ability to select and use personal protective equipment; perform advance control, containment, and confinement operations; implement decontamination procedures; and identify and verify known and unknown materials by using field survey instruments and equipment.

The HSERC has established that a person who may be assigned to a hazardous materials response team shall be certified as a Hazardous Materials Technician upon successfully completion of two explicit two-week courses, a total 160 hours of training. These courses are the National Fire Academy's Chemistry of Hazardous Materials, recently updated and now called Chemistry for Emergency Response, and an 80-hour State-level course commonly known as the Hazardous Materials Technician course. The latter was developed for use in Hawaii about 12 years ago when the National Fire Academy dropped its Hazardous Materials Tactical Considerations course. This pair of courses is the only grouping of courses that meet the HSERC-defined requirements for the Hazmat Technician, as derived from the mandates of the HAZWOPER standard (HRS Title, chapter 99 and 29 CFR 1910.120).

The National Fire Academy's two-week Hazardous Materials Operating Site Practices (HMOSP) course does not contain the obligatory hands-on activities to allow the candidate's performance skills to be evaluated. Thus, the HMOSP course cannot be substituted for the currently accepted State level course known as the Hazardous Materials Technician course for purposes of Technician certification. An emergency responder who successfully completes the Chemistry and the HMOSP courses will not be eligible for certification as a Hazardous Materials Technician in Hawaii.

This situation is being brought to your attention at this time because HSERC has become aware of a proposal to present the Chemistry/HMOSP pairing for Technician certification in Hawaii in 2005. Although HMOSP is an excellent course, regrettably it does not carry out the training mandates for a Hazardous Materials Technician.







HONOLULU LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING MARCH 4, 2005 OAHU CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY

Chair Carter Davis called the meeting to order at 9:03 A.M.

I. INTRODUCTIONS/REMARKS/ADOPTION OF MINUTES

C. Davis welcomed everyone and gave introductory remarks. Attendees (list attached) then introduced themselves. Since there were a number of new members, C. Davis discussed the background of the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act and the LEPC. The minutes of the December 9, 2004 meeting were then approved as written.

II. OLD BUSINESS

LEPC BUDGET REPORT, 2ND QUARTER, FY05

III. NEW BUSINESS

HSERC MEETING, 12/16/04

L. Nakai briefed the members on the December 16th meeting of the HSERC. Larry Lau discussed revisions to plans to comply with NIMS requirements, and announced that the vacant HEPCRA/HSERC position gained fill approval.

County LEPCs then provided updates on their activities. The Big Island discussed the Naphtha barge fire, library of conference material, and concerns on Hazmat Tech level training. C. Davis provided additional details on the naphtha barge fire and the Tech level training issue. Maui discussed the potential use of their DOT Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) planning grant project information by the Maui Police Department for emergency response. Kauai announced that they are a potential host of the Hazmat Tech course, but lack the

props and equipment to support that course. Kauai is also updating their plans and will conduct a Strategic National Stockpile exercise sometime in March or April 2005. C. Davis provided a summary of the Honolulu LEPC December meeting, and discussed a visit to the Kakaako high-tech facility and a recent tabletop exercise with the Airport Post Office.

B. Ekimoto then gave a Tier II update. A total of 868 facilities have reported in 2003, and Tier II Submit 2004 is available for downloading. M. Ardito provided the following EPA update: Mike Leavitt is leaving EPA for Health & Human Services; National Response Plan "roll-out" days were scheduled for 6 cities; and Phosmet was deleted from the Extremely Hazardous Materials list. W. Chung, State Civil Defense, then gave the following update: the WMD Cameo Course presented by LSU is available; Hazmat Tech level training will be given priority for state funding; grant reporting requirements; and that the FBI and TSA will begin checking commercial driver's licenses starting in January 2005.

The Honolulu LEPC then reported that their 2005 HMEP project would not cost as much as originally estimated, and will return \$6K to the HSERC. The HSERC then approved re-allocation of this \$6K to the Maui LEPC. NIMS compliancy was then discussed, and HSERC members were reminded of the requirement for 1st Responders to be NIMS compliant by October 1, 2005 to qualify for federal grants. Larry Lau mentioned that he would be working with DBEDT to provide information on HEPCRA and Tier II requirements to businesses as part of the incorporation process.

The next HSERC meeting was then scheduled for March 10, 2005.

C.L.E.A.N. UPDATE

E. Lee discussed C.L.E.A.N. activities. The annual update of the C.L.E.A.N. Campbell Industrial Park Resources Guide is on schedule to be published this spring. The C.L.E.A.N. newsletter was also discussed, and LEPC members interested in getting a copy were asked to contact Emerson.

PEARL CITY - WAIPIO GENTRY PROJECT

L. Nakai updated the LEPC on the '05 HMEP project to assess hazards in the Pearl City Industrial Park and Waipio Gentry Business Park. Dixon Risk Services, Inc. began work on this project in January. Survey letters should be going out to facilities in the March/April timeframe.

T. Clairmont asked if the Kaiser clinic in the Waipio Gentry area should have a decontamination capability to handle walk-in patients that may be contaminated by a chemical release in the local area. There was agreement to wait until more is known about facilities in the area before considering developing a decontamination capability. Toby also asked if respirator canisters effective for CBRN agents that are planned for use at hospitals were also effective against industrial chemicals. C. Davis mentioned that CBRN canisters are effective for most nerve agents, biological agents, and radiological substances and are generally not effective for

industrial chemicals. C. Davis agreed to gather additional information and reply back to T. Clairmont.

17TH ANNUAL NASTTPO CONFERENCE AND HMEP GRANTS ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

L. Nakai informed LEPC members of the upcoming NASTTPO & HMEP Grants Conference scheduled for April 4-8, 2005 at Seattle, WA. Participants include DOT, EPA, DHS, USCG, NOAA, Regional, State, Tribal, Local and Industry representatives. Topics scheduled are: Eplan Tier II Submit, SARA Title III, Hazmat Security, Hospital issues, Clandestine Drug Labs, all hazards planning, Tribal issues, Share Fair, Cameo training, and a Boeing tour.

HOMELAND SECURITY PROJECTS

L. Nakai discussed proposed Homeland Security funded projects. The City & County Homeland Security Committee approved funds to update the LEPC's 2002 Extremely Hazardous Substance Hazard Analysis and the 2003 Honolulu Harbor Area Hazard Analysis Projects. Also proposed is a commodity flow study for hazardous materials/dangerous goods transiting Honolulu Harbor, Barbers Point Deep Draft Harbor, and the Honolulu International Airport. Sources of relevant data and stakeholders are being identified to support this commodity flow study. P. Epstein suggested that the project be discussed at the State Law Enforcement Committee to gain their support, and will assist getting the topic on their next meeting agenda.

IV. OTHER BUSINESS/SCHEDULE NEXT MEETING

L. Nakai announced that the Chair of the Pearl City Neighborhood Board saw the LEPC meeting agenda in the Honolulu Star Bulletin and contacted him to schedule a presentation on the Pearl City-Waipio Gentry Project at the March 29th meeting of the neighborhood board.

L. Nakai also discussed Cameo Companion notebooks for 1st responders that the LEPC hopes to acquire in cooperation with other states by participating in a group purchase of the notebooks.

The date for the next LEPC meeting is pending the next scheduled HSERC meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 9:56 A.M.

HSERC MEETING, 9/23/04

L. Nakai briefed the members on the September 23rd meeting of the HSERC. Larry Lau discussed the following topics: the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) exercise that took place in August; DOH budget preparation; new supervisory role for State laboratories, and Maria Lutz was introduced as the new American Red Cross representative to the HSERC.

County LEPCs then provided updates on their activities. The Big Island was not present and did not provide a report. Maui reported that they will be providing more training for public and private sectors, discussed the Hazcat training they

Bob Caplan provided an orientation on the EPA Pacific Rim Center and discussed a recent visit of a Philippine delegation. Ken Lesperance then discussed HMEP training and the WMD Cameo Course presented by Louisiana State University. He also stated that the HMEP grant is expected to remain at the same funding level as last year.

HSERC members then approved '05 HMEP Planning Grant Projects submitted by Honolulu, Hawaii and Maui. Kauai will not be participating in this program for '05. Ed Gomes described the State Attorney General's Environmental Crimes Unit. Comprised of 2 investigators and 2 lawyers, the unit is actively pursuing cases and can be reached at 586-1240. The LEPC was informed that Ed Gomes has since left the unit and is now with the State Narcotics Division.

The next HSERC meeting was then scheduled for December 16, 2004.

C.L.E.A.N. UPDATE

Ruedi Tobler provided a C.L.E.A.N. update. HFD Captain Maguire gave a presentation on the Continuing Challenge Hazmat Workshop at C.L.E.A.N.'s last board meeting and thanked C.L.E.A.N. for their \$8,000 grant to send 5 HFD personnel to the workshop. C.L.E.A.N. is also recruiting new members. Grace Pacific is the newest C.L.E.A.N. member and H-Power may soon be joining.

AIRPORT AREA PROJECT

Paul Dixon of Dixon Risk Services, Inc. gave a presentation on the Airport Area Project. He covered methodology, Levels of Concern, chemicals studied, and hazard areas. Marplot maps were used to display the study area, facilities identified, and potential hazard areas.

PEARL CITY - WAIPIO GENTRY PROJECT

L. Nakai then updated the LEPC on the '05 HMEP project to assess hazards in the Pearl City Industrial Park and Waipio Gentry Business Park. An LEPC selection committee selected Dixon Risk Services, Inc. for this \$16,000 project. The project should start in January 2005 and be completed in September 2005.

2004 HAZMAT EXPLO, NASTTPO MID-YEAR & EPA 9TH REGION CONFERENCE

The 2004 Hazmat Explo was held in Las Vegas, NV during November 15-19, 2004. 792 participants attended the conference, which offered 9 separate tracks, pre- and post-conference training, and a tour of Yucca Mountain. The NASTTPO Mid-Year and EPA 9th Region Conferences also took place during that week.

NASTTPO Mid-Year Conference Highlights:

DOT Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Program Manager Charlie Rogoff provided an update on the HMEP program. He is attempting to increase funding of the \$7.8M program, and reiterated that overtime for drills cannot be funded with HMEP funds and that the training/planning split formula cannot be changed. He also stated that there might be a 2nd printing of the 2004 Emergency Response Guidebooks. The computer-based hazmat refresher course, two-thirds completed, is on hold due to a lack of funding. HFD has participated in a pilot evaluation program for the computer course.

Tom Bergman, Oklahoma DEQ, described a Tier Two reporting system that Oklahoma developed. Tier 2 Submit is accessed via a website and data is gathered in separate modules and entered into Cameo, Access and Oracle for different functionality. They also developed a Cameo Companion Workbook and are seeking funding to print and distribute this nation-wide. A Landview 3-D Terrain Viewer that is in development was also demonstrated.

Sue Mencer, DHS, discussed Homeland Security Grants. \$4B in grants will be distributed in FY05, for a total of \$8B since 9/11/01. She described the challenge of providing funds to States and Locals. Future audits of the program will focus on interoperability and information sharing – the two top goals provided by States. Homeland Security preparedness as mandated by HSPD 8 will be performance based and measured against 15 scenarios. These scenarios will be scaled in difficulty to match capability levels of the community.

John Bresland, Chemical Safety Board, described the board's function and role, and shared insight into a number of safety issues. The board will be focusing on the combustible dust issue, as industry often overlooks potential hazards from combustible dust. He stated that industry must work with the community so that citizens fully understand the nature of the operation and potential hazards and stressed that prevention is much easier than dealing with the aftermath of a chemical accident.

EPA 9th Region Conference Highlights:

Sherry Fielding, EPA Headquarters, provided an update on EPA activities. The former Chemical Emergency Preparedness and Prevention Office (CEPPO) is now the Office of Emergency Management (OEM), with an all hazards focus. EPA is analyzing the recent Risk Management Program (RMP) submissions and will be conducting field visits to verify data. There were over 50,000 downloads of Tier 2 Submit, and 25 states are now accepting Tier 2 Submit. EPA is considering a web-based version of Tier 2 Submit in 2006. The E-Plan System, where facility plans and tier 2 data resides on a server for access by 1st responders and private business via a secure Internet connection was described. The EPA Region 6 pilot program of the E-Plan system was described to representatives of various states, to include Hawaii.

Mary Wesling, EPA Region 9, described enforcement activities. Inspections have increased from 8 in '99 to 75 in '04, thanks to increased staffing. The focus of

inspections has been on EPCRA and RMP information for chlorine and anhydrous ammonia facilities. EPA inspections include first conducting Compliance Assistance Workshops to assist the facility, followed in a month by an inspection. Fines can be assessed for up to \$32K/chem./incident/day. EPA considers any report to the NRC of a release later than 15 minutes to be a late report, but will consider factors contributing to the lateness of the report. For '05, EPA will be conducting workshops, examining new RMP data, and working with industry for inspector training. EPA will be visiting Hawaii sometime during 2005.

IV. OTHER BUSINESS/SCHEDULE NEXT MEETING

- C. Davis gave a quick briefing about 2 after-hour incidents at a new IC chip manufacturing facility on Keawe Street, involving liquid nitrogen. HFD was able to obtain assistance in contacting the facility personnel by contacting the chemical supplier of the facility using CAMEO data. HFD and LEPC have since visited the facility. The facility has filed EPCRA Tier II reports in September 2004.
- C. Davis also mentioned HFD's involvement in a tabletop exercise at the U.S. Postal facility at the airport to prepare for a new anthrax screener that will become operational on January 21, 2005. The exercise reviewed local, state and federal response procedures in the event of a positive anthrax reading.

The date for the next LEPC meeting is pending the next scheduled HSERC meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 A.M.

Ken Lesperance HazMat Training Notes For HSERC 03/09/05

Training (HMEP \$45,914) - Same as last you

HMEP Training funds allow for one HazMat Technician Course this year. Maui is the schedule host and will be allotted 15 seats. Each other island will be allotted 5 seats. The course will be held between June and August. Dates will be announced directly to the fire departments when it is scheduled.

There are two refreshers on Maui and Hawaii County. We are awaiting Maui's preferred months in order to hire a contractor to schedule them.

Kauai County will be having two refreshers, provided through UC Davis on an EPA grant.

Honolulu County has opted to perform in house refreshers and declined HMEP funds.

Unless anyone else has a training request, any funds left over after the HazMat Refreshers will be used to defray the cost of transporting personnel to the HazMat Technician course.

Planning (\$43,006)

Request to purchase hardware to support planning - Maui LEPC requested to purchase computer and other hardware to support planning. US DOT says that we can expend up to 5% of the total grant, or \$4,446. Because the request came in between HSERC meetings, I asked Scott Kekuewa to contact the other LEPC's and ask if they intended to purchase any hardware. He reported that they did not.

To purchase hardware, you will need to write a letter supporting the purchase and give estimates on costs for specific items. I will forward the letter (or e-mail to US DOT Charles Rogoff for approval). I have no problem with purchases as long as we stay under the threshold.

Exercise

We did not receive CERCLA funds this year. The exercise cycle indicates two functions on Kauai this year, the Table Top Exercise and a Field Exercise Design Class. FEMA Region IX Ken Chin said that he will provide an instructor for the course, but we do not have funds to support the Table Top Exercise. There should be enough students from the Table Top Design Class from last year to plan and execute the Exercise.

Cameo Support Documents

We can use HMEP funds to support the purchase of CAMEO documents, but the money will come out of either unencumbered Planning Funds or the remaining Training Funds that I was going to apply to student travel.



PREVENTION AND PREPAREDNESS ACTIVITIES

New National Response Plan Signed

The long-awaited new National Response Plan, required by a Homeland Security Presidential Directive, was signed by the 31 federal participating departments or agencies in early December. Formal announcement of the signing was made on January 6, 2005. The announcement was accompanied by the one-hour taping of an Emergency Education Network (EENET) program about the new NRP that was broadcast on January 19 and February 16. With the recent release of the NRP and its long-term objectives and goals, FEMA has announced the availability of the following course at http://training.fema.gov/EMIWeb/IS/crslist.asp The new NRP has been posted to the DHS Web site: www.dhs.gov/nationalresponseplan

Bush Picks Stephen Johnson to Head the EPA

On March 4, President Bush nominated Stephen Johnson, the acting administrator of the EPA, to take over the helm of the agency. If Johnson is confirmed by the Senate, he would be the first career EPA employee and first professional scientist to head the agency. Johnson, 53, a native of Washington, DC, has worked at the EPA for 24 years and previously served as assistant administrator for the Office of Prevention, Pesticides and Toxic Substances, among other posts. Bush previously chose former EPA administrator Michael Leavitt last December to become the new secretary for the Department of Health and Human Services.

International Conference on 20th Anniversary of Bhopal Tragedy

In December 2004, a U.S. delegation joined experts from around the world at the International Conference on the 20th anniversary of the Bhopal tragedy which was held in Kanpur, India. The U.S. representatives took this opportunity to share a historical perspective of the U.S. chemical accident prevention and community right-to-know programs which were triggered to a large extent by the Bhopal incident. EPA Pacific Southwest Region Completes Template for LEPC Counter-Terrorism Annex

The U.S. EPA Pacific Southwest, in tandem with the Arizona Division of Emergency Management and the Coconino County Local Emergency Planning Committee, recently completed a "model" LEPC Counter-Terrorism Annex for the HazMat Response Plan. We recently inserted some information about the new Emergency Support Function #13 (Public Safety and Security) of the National Response Plan. EPA was requested a while ago by Arizona to help develop this annex for Coconino as a model for the mid-size and rural counties in Arizona. In some format, this plan annex could also serve as a model for some other "small" LEPCs around the country.

 - 1.1 Opening remarks by Larry Lau. Larry made mention of the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) exercise that took place in August 2004, and Jean Conger is the DOH Disaster Planner. There were several agencies that had participated in the event. At the present, Larry is making preparations for the State Budget.
 - 1.2 A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes from meeting #55.
 - 1.3 Attendees introduced themselves.

2) Local Planning Committee (LEPC) Updates

2.1 Hawaii

No representative present to give an update.

2.2 Kauai

Clifford Ikeda: 1) After October of this year, there will not be a police chief on duty. 2) There was a white goods fire incident that occurred and the development of communication protocols will need to be addressed because of it. 3) 3 individuals will be attending the Hazmat Explo conference in Las Vegas, Nevada, the week of November 15th. 4) A local SNS event is planned for either March or April of 2005.

2.3 Maui

Scott Kekuewa: 1) 4th quarter LEPC meeting was held on September 8, 2004. 2) Regarding next fiscal year, will concentrate on more training for the public and private sectors. 3) Will be hosting a HazCat Training at the Maui Community College on October 4-8. 24 students will be in attendance. 4) Plans in work to increase the awareness of Tier II reporting by way of Public Service Announcements. 5) Kyle Watanabe of SCD retired on September 30th. 5) Next LEPC meeting is scheduled for December 8, 2004. 6) Comment on the SNS event on Maui-not too favorable per the fire department.

2.4 Oahu

Leland Nakai [Carter Davis]: 1) LEPC meeting was held on September 17, 2004-Scott Kekuewa's presentation on GIS, EPA visits (site inspections and RMP workshop), Bob Caplan on the Pacific Rim Center, Clean Updates (Refer to minutes). 3) Received \$8000 from CLEAN to send 5 HFD personnel to attend Continuing Challenge in Sacramento in September-CLEAN sponsored 5 firefighters and the Honolulu LEPC also sponsored 5 firefighters. Since Team Hawaii placed 2nd in game activities, they were awarded scholarships for next year's Continuing Challenge. 4) A tanker truck containing only water overturned. 5) 2 LEPC members will be attending the HazMat Explo conference in November. 6) Airport Project-42 non-Tier II filers have been identified as having chemicals.

3) West Nile Virus Update

Larry stated that help was needed to larvacide prevalent mosquito breeding areas (storm drains).

4) EPA Update

Bob Caplan: 1) Gave an explanation of what the Pacific Rim Center is, it is an international resource center which assists other countries in developing, for example, their own environmental programs (Handouts attached). One such case is that of the Philippine Government, who asked help regarding chemical emergencies, etc., therefore, the Center will be hosting a study tour for them (The Hawaiian Islands is one of the states that will be on their tour agenda). The Center also assists with the Criminal Enforcement Program for Hawaii, Guam, etc., 2) Hazmat Explo, registration deadline is October 15th.

5) HMEP Training Classes a. Exercises

Ken Lesperance: 1) In August, there was a Cameo Training course funded by the Office of Domestic Preparedness (ODP). ODP will provide free training, which would include use of their computers if a headcount of 20-24 students can be guaranteed. This course is Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) involved and tied into LAN View. It is also available to the outer islands. Ken will be presenting this at the next Honolulu LEPC meeting. 2) Will be working with Kauai to help with their HazMat Technician Training [HazMat Refresher training]. 3) Big Island hosted HazMat Technician Training this year. 4) Maui is next on the list-next year- to host training because they had traded off with the Big Island.

5) 2 Hazmat refresher courses being planned for each county. 6) The general HMEP planning tool is the same as last year's amounts. There will be an official letter from Ed Teixeira that will be sent out addressing this.

6) HMEP Planning Grant Projects FY05

Curtis Martin: 1) Budget for the HMEP Planning Grant projects for FY05 is \$43,006, 20% of which is \$10,752 – the State's portion. The HMEP project proposals were submitted from the counties (Kauai was not included). Per Clifford, Kauai will not be participating in this upcoming year's grant because of a lack of personnel. The committee will need approval for only 3 of the counties, the Big Island, Oahu and Maui. Larry invited a motion to approve the use of the \$9100 from the reserved 20% match for HMEP Planning Grants and that would be distributed to the counties of Oahu, Hawaii and Maui (reserved 20% amounts to \$10,752). The motion was made and seconded. The motion was carried.

7) Funds for Rural Fire and Rescue Efforts

Curtis Martin: 1) Local Government Reimbursement (LGR) brochure-funds are available for reimbursement if applied for after an incident.

8) Drug Lab Training Class Comments

Keith Kawaoka: 1) Well attended, an eye-opening course. The EPA instructors were very good.

9) Introduction of the Environmental Crimes Unit

Ed Gomes: 1) Introduction of Ed's partner, Ryan Yamasaki and Environmental Crime attorney, Dean Young. 2) Ed and Ryan attended the Flexi class sponsored by EPA. 3) Explanation of what the program encompass-so far there have been 2 felony indictments, some misdemeanor crimes, a total of 5 cases processed. 4) Outreach to the LEPC-to let community know that their office exists and to notify them (ph. no.586-1240, M-F, for normal business hours and ph. no. 864-8774, after hours) if the public has any information about environmental crimes such as illegal dumping of chemicals, etc., Also it was suggested that the DOH environmental notices website be taken advantage of so that word gets around about their office and what they do and what they are looking for in terms of crimes committed. 5) Leland Nakai – Environmental Task Force-EPA headed this. 6) Development of illegal dumping Task Force here in Hawaii per Bob Caplan, must raise awareness level.

10) Other Business

Genevieve Salmonson: 1) Tripler is going to build a level 3 lab. Does the State lab have level 3 capabilities? The University is a Biological State Lab (BSL) facility.

Larry: 1) Has task to supervise the State Lab Divisions-still learning.

He made a motion to accept the minutes from meeting #56 but Carter requested the minutes be amended, (2.4 Oahu, Leland Nakai gave the presentation, not Carter), Warren Chung also asked for an amendment to the minutes, (5) HMEP Training Classes and Exercises, wording changed from, their "HazMat Refresher training" to "HazMat Technician Training"). After corrections were made, a motion was set to accept the amended minutes and it was then seconded (Carter/Bowen).
 - 1.3 Attendees introduced themselves.

2) Local Planning Committee (LEPC) Updates

2.1 Hawaii

John Bowen: 1) On Sunday, July 4, 2005 at 1:15p.m, there was a fuel barge fire, a potential for disaster. 1.1 million gallons were involved. A pump malfunction occurred and fire started on the deck. There were no crewmembers on board. There were no written emergency procedures (plans) to be found but later plans were discovered but had never been used before this incident. LEPC and the Fire Department are now working with the company. 2) 2 LEPC members were sent to the HazMat Explo Conference in Las Vegas. 3) Development of a library system containing conference materials is a work in progress (conference information is in storage at the present). 4) Hawaii State Fire Council (HSFC) will be offering an eight hour Tech level training course but it will only be classroom taught, without hands-on experience (this does not satisfy 29 CFR requirements). John suggested that the HSERC committee send an official letter asking the Fire Departments for a redefinition of what the requirements are. Winston Lum is the head of the HSFC. Carter offered to speak with him on the matter and plans to get back to Larry on it. Meanwhile, John will draft a letter stating that the course that will be taught does not meet the criteria. 5) Mike Cripps- Curtis Martin responded to the barge incident but felt they didn't know how to handle the chemical (Naphtha). Larry-by the next HSERC meeting, further reporting will be needed on this. Mike-should deal with it like a gas.

2.2 Kauai

Clifford Ikeda: 1) There is a possibility of hosting a HazMat course but what is expected of the hosting county regarding props and equipment? Without knowing what is expected of the hosting county, a commitment cannot be made at this time. 2) Attended the HazMat Explo Conference in Las Vegas. 3) We are currently updating our plans. 4) There will be a full-scale exercise in April 2005.

2.3 Maui

Scott Kekuewa: 1) 1st quarter LEPC meeting was held on December 15, 2004 (Agenda Attached). Discussed the HMEP project (sharing information with the contractor), Operating budget, etc,.

2.4 Oahu

Carter Davis: 1) LEPC meeting was held on December 9, 2004 (Honolulu LEPC meeting agenda and minutes attached). 2) PowerPoint presentation of Paul Dixon's Airport Project (Handout). 3) Waiwai Loop Area-a particular fireworks company keeps moving around. They were accidentally discovered again while scoping and surveying the area (Airport project). Tom Smyth: There is a problem with fireworks being in close proximity with other hazardous substances. Carter: It's a zoning issue. There is no violation in the fire code as long as they manage it properly. 4) NASTTPO highlights (LEPC meeting minutes). 5) Kakaako-there is a new facility (APIC) conducting business in integrated circuit chip research and development (not a chip manufacturer). There are all sorts of exotic chemical substances being used. 6) On December 1, 2004, a tabletop was held at the Main Station U.S. Post Office by the airport to test their response plans. Also, commencing January 22, 2005, an

Anthrax mail reader (PRC-polym se chain reaction technology) will be print into effect. All flat mail with pass thru this screening device.

3) Tier II Update

Beryl Ekimoto: 1) For reporting year 2003, so far, the total number of Tier II facilities that includes all islands amounts to 868 facilities. 2) The newest version of CAMEO works with Tier 2 Submit 2004. Tier 2 Submit 2004 is out on the web (Handout). The contact person is Janice Witul of EPA Region 9 if there are any problems downloading the software. 3) Phosmet has been taken off of the Extremely Hazardous Substance (EHS) list.

4) EPA Update

Mike Ardito: 1) Pocket calendars with Region 9 contact numbers printed on back. 2) EPA is preparing for a new administrator. 3) EPA chief, Mike Leavitt leaves EPA to become the new Health & Human Services Secretary. 4) New NRP (National Response Plan) has been signed by all agencies. There will be a national "roll-out" of one-day workshops in 6 major cities. 5) U.S. EPA leadership awards given out to 3 winners. 6) Deletion of Phosmet from EHS list. 7) CAMEOfm update. 8) the EPP program contact person for Hawaii, Mike Ardito (Handout).

5) HMEP Training Classes and Exercises

Warren Chung: 1) Free CAMEO classes are available-need to give Ken Lesperance a call. Also can provide a discount on reference books if the headcount is adequate. 2) Tech level classes are a priority, the balance of the monies will be used for basic tech level training, a needs assessment will have to be done. 3) Regarding the Grants, there are reporting obligations such as within a 90-day period. Also, all invoices submitted must be originals. 4) FBI and TSA will be required to check commercial driver's licenses starting January 1, 2005.

6) Airport Project Presentation

Carter Davis: 1) Tied the presentation into Honolulu LEPC update portion.

7) Other Business

Scott Kekuewa: Since Honolulu LEPC will be returning the unused portion of their grant, \$6000, could we ask for more money?

Larry Lau: If there are no objections, the HMEP budget shall be amended, a motion to reallocate \$6000 from Honolulu to Maui was made and carried (Bowen/Smyth).

Mike Cripps: Regarding the January 28, 2004 training that took place at the UH lab-was hard hit by the flood. HEER equipment/items were luckily saved.

Carter Davis: States signed off on an agreement with NIMS (National Incident Management System), it is stated that by October 1, 2005, all State and Counties adopt NIMS and that all emergency responders must be trained according to the NIMS. In order to be in compliance with the regulations, the training requirement is to take an online course (NIMS 700) found at the FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) training website. The duration of the course is approximately 45 minutes to 2 hours. This course will be a recommendation to the Chief so that all firefighters take it.

Larry Lau: Will try to obtain a NIMS guideline cheat sheet from State Civil Defense.

Warren Chung: Last quarter, over 200 individuals took the course.

Larry Lau: In January 2005, Larry will be attending a meeting with Dan Morrison in regards to permitting, that is if a business is required to comply with certain regulations. Larry thought that it would be a good idea for the HEER office to get involved so that there would be a way of detecting new businesses that should be reporting under HEPCRA-Tier 2. Tom Smyth also mentioned DCCA getting involved too, that way it would be a "one stop shop" kind of information center.

8) Schedule next HSERC means

The next HSERC meeting will be held on Thursday, March 10, 2005.
