- 1. Curtis Martin called the meeting to order at 9:01 am.
  - 1.1 Acknowledged Captain Carter Davis for over 20 years of service to HSERC. First person from Honolulu Fire Department he met when he came to Hawaii with Coast Guard. Thanked Carter for his service to HSERC.
  - 1.2 Approval of minutes. Scott moved to adopt minutes from meeting #80. Albert Seconded. Minutes adopted.

#### 2. LEPC Updates:

- 2.1 Hawaii: Henry Silva
  - 2.1.1 LEPC meeting December 2, 2010, 14 people attended. BEI, HELCO, Puna Geothermal had attended. Next meeting is March 3, 2011 at county Civil Defense office in Hilo, 10:00 12:00 pm.
  - 2.1.2 Continue to develop EOP, in final review. Incorporating LEPC EOP into County's Plan.
  - 2.1.3 Providing Training for hospitals on decontamination, three day course. LEPC's monies being used, will try for HMEP reimbursement if possible.
  - 2.1.4 Budgeted for newspaper ads and public service announcements for Tier II Reporting. In finally stage, will be implemented this coming reporting year.
  - 2.1.5 One incident, HELCO reported transformer fell, all contents leaked out. Not recoverable due to run off of storm.
  - 2.1.6 NASTTPO "Moving Schools from Hazardous and Toxic Chemicals toward Safer, Greener Chemistry." Recognized this is a problem within the state. LEPC is

investigating it further as a project that can be worked in cooperation with DOE, private schools, and industry to cleanup schools of hazardous materials.

#### 2.2 Kauai: Albert Kaui

- 2.2.1 CST from Oahu came to train with Hazmat Station at KaiKea in October. Three days training, did Level A entries, sampling, each crew had eight hours with CST. Guys were happy.
- 2.2.2 Last meeting October 28, 2010, next meeting is February 17, 2011 at EOC Civil Defense, 9:00 am. No Hazmat incidents.

#### 2.3 Maui: Scott Kekuewa

- 2.3.1 Met December 2, 2010, talked about LEPC funded training. September had two day Hazmat I.Q. training for fire personnel. Both days filled 28 30 people.
- 2.3.2 Currently doing CST Annual Training and Exercise, it started-on-December 1, 2, 3 on equipment. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, doing scenarios, follow up is on Thursday and Friday.
- 2.3.3 LEPC would like to provide information on Administration Rules that were just signed and went into effect, to facilities in Maui County. Let them know rules have been adopted and where to go for more information. No incidents, next meeting March 10, 2011.

#### 2.4 Honolulu: Carter Davis

- 2.4.1 LEPC meeting will be December 21, it will be his last meeting as chair of the LEPC, and he will no longer be a member of HSERC. Fire Chief selected Alex Adams as member of Honolulu LEPC, does not mean he will be chair. Members of the Honolulu LEPC will have to elect the next chair; selection could be done at the next meeting. Carter is researching how a transition is done. This is to advise the commission about selection of the next chair and the approval from the Mayor. Discussion between Curtis and Carter on selection of next Honolulu LEPC.
- 2.4.2 At the September 24, meeting Carter had discussed his presentation to the July meeting of the Regional Response Team on Marine Fire Fighting. Expressed concerns of Honolulu and Neighbor Island LEPC's on what state of readiness or preparedness for Marine Fire Fighting Activities in our harbors statewide. Made them aware of the level of concern.
- 2.4.3 Director of Department of Emergency Management, Mel Kaku informed Carter his intent to request the new mayor fill the Hazmat Position at DEM. Explained how this position helped the Honolulu LEPC and the importance of it. Discussion between Curtis, Carter in description of duties for that position.
- 2.4.4 HFD concerns about "After hours Availability of SOSC (State On Scene Coordinatior). Gave example of event that occurred, started on a Thursday, closure was greater then 72 hours. Letter being written to Director of Health. Great concern on number of SOSCs needed to handle incidents. Carter and Curtis encouraged other counties to express their concerns about lack of coverage, no SOSC on duty. Carter explained what happens at an incident that needs SOSC input to be in compliance with regulations. Curtis added the SOSC have the authority to okay those actions.
- 2.4.5 Researching using Tier II money to purchase equipment that they can't get through regular purchase request. To be a Type 1 team they need a Hazmat RAD Identifier.

Don't have any, would like to purchase 2, offer to purchase one with the police department. They have funds to support purchase.

#### 3. EPA: Mike Ardito

Handouts on table, Mike not able to be here. Information on NASTTPO available on handout.

#### 4. HMEP Update: Clarice Chung

- Closing this year's HMEP Grant, Planning received \$70,100, expenses \$7,000, returning \$24,000. Rest of Planning Grant transferred to Training Grant. Spent \$120,000 for Training Grant. Two sessions of 160 hour courses and to fund travel reimbursement for neighbor island attendees. Grant the same this year, if anyone has a planning project, let her know the budget. Kauai wants to sent more then five people to the 160 hour course on Oahu and Maui, if possible. She could have funded more people this year for Kauai. Can't carry over money from past year, needs to know in advance-if planning money will be used by LEPC's and the budget. This year amount is \$70,100, will be transferring some to training. Discussion about amount of money returned last year and what project was planned and did not go through. Curtis encouraged counties to do projects for information that can be gained. Clarice would like to have a budget, an idea of how much to transfer to training. Discussion with Henry, Clarice, Curtis about transferring more planning money over to training. Carter explained about HMEP original program and new add-on (allocation). Henry made a motion "To Move Whatever Is Allowed From Planning Into Training From HMEP Grant", Carter seconded. No discussion wanted, motion approved. Only LEPC planning project is for Hawaii County printing request. It would be \$6 - \$10,000, quotes needs to be in by mid January. USDOT approval needed to move monies.
- 4.1.2 There are 2 160 hour courses for Oahu and Maui in 2011. Oahu Chemistry course is from April 4-15, Technical course from May 16-27. Both at Honolulu Fire Department. Maui Chemistry course from April 25-May 6, Technical course July 11-22, at National Guard Kihei Armory. Kauai has requested 5 additional slots, no other planning projects, Clarice can fund this. She needs to work out budget first. HMEP 2012, Oahu and Hawaii County to receive 160 hour courses. Honolulu does not send anyone to other counties training.

#### 5. Harbor Fire Fighting Status

Carter gave a presentation to the Oceanic Regional Response Team. Carter and Curtis explained about Coast Guard looking at <u>Harbor Fire Fighting</u> in combination with firefighting and salvage regulation. Not sure how new regulations would work. Requires shippers of petroleum to provide fire protection for movement of product, it includes port facilities. New law, Coast Guard investigating how to implement law nationwide. Unclear about what group or organizations will be involved with these regulations.

#### 6. NASTTPO: Carter Davis, Henry Silva

6.1.1 HMEP funded at 26.1 million, grants to states remain the same. Hawaii should get the same as last year. Adding staff to HMEP Program, Congress wants more information on how money is spent. Can't be used for all Hazards, WMD events, this is Transportation Grant. Grant applications can't contain all hazards and WMD information. Funds returned program are put back into the Grant Program.

- 6.1.2 Ken Anderson from Ammonia Safety Training Institute, main topic "One Plan Approach". Talked about Ammonia, Chlorine TIH Safety. Top 2 Toxic Inhalation Hazard gases that first responders nationwide respond to, it's similar here. Every single Ammonia industrial fatality in 2009, people did not have any Personal Protective Equipment on at time of event. Comment directed to industry, not so much responders. All Fire Codes, Compress Gas Codes, state that while working on systems, tanks, cylinders, "Don Proper Level of PPE". He explained what to wear, emphasizing to the industries, personnel need to use proper equipment. Example given of Hazmat here going to Ammonia incident. Industry people not using any PPE. Gave amounts of Ammonia used in World, US, amount in percentage used in different industry. In Hawaii used mainly as refrigerate. In EPA Risk Management Program, Ammonia topped release TIH at 43%, Chlorine second at 25%. Almost half of these joint releases due to valve malfunction especially overpressure valves. All presentation available at NASTTPO website, www.NASTTPO.com.
- 6.1.3 Lynn Beasley Cercal EPCRA Administration. Focus on farms, <u>Animal Waste Emission</u>. Large animal farms generate huge waste emission, under EPRCA RMP process, it should be reportable quantities. The National Air Emissions Monitoring Program will come out with emissions table for farms. Based on number of animals at farms. Example of what maybe on table. Another item, <u>Lead Acid Batteries and Sulfuric Acid</u>. Includes new and used car lots, golf courses because of golf carts, there is lack of reporting. Hawaii has several courses reporting; however there are many golf courses. Battery technology is going away from lead acid. If they have other types of technology, they don't need to report.
- 6.1.4 Tim Gablehouse, outgoing president of NASTTPO, power point presentation about LEPCs. Carter recommends reviewing. On NASTTPO website, went over key points.
- 6.1.5 Carole Cameron, Director International Affairs for FEMA. Outreach is worldwide, talked about American Samoa. Problems with communication, confusion on legal position that American Samoa has with U.S. They did have good relationship working with people there. NFL League and players wanted to help, couldn't do it as an organization direct with American Samoa Government, they went through FEMA.
- William Wright, Chemical Safety Board, gave presentation. Dwight Peavey from USEPA 6.1.6 Region I, "Moving Schools from Hazardous and Toxic Chemicals Towards Safe, Green, and Sustainable Chemistry Programs", in New England, Massachusetts. Gave awareness training to new chemistry teachers. Trying to get school programs to develop Integrated Chemical Management Program. Similar to what followed after cleanup problem at U.H. Manoa. Having one person order chemicals and keep them in one location. Teachers request for use in classroom per day. Currently each teacher has a budget for chemicals, many do not do inventory and buy more chemicals each year. Inventory grows, no disposal, many chemicals can't be identified. Massachusetts and New England putting in "Significant School Safety Program". Good participation, new teachers have more training and education about seriousness of lab chemicals. Henry talked about this to his LEPC, been e-mailing Mr. Peavey. EPA recognizing this program as valid and requested he put it into a working plan available to different schools, or cities to use. Hawaii county does school inspections, seen a large amount of chemicals no longer being used. Mr. Peavey questioned," Are we exposing students and teachers to unnecessary chemical exposure?" Example, air sampling done in classroom with chemicals. Allowable threshold limit for exposure to volatile organic compounds exceeded normal OSHA requirements. Scenario, if earthquake knocked chemicals off shelves, what mixture would result. What are the hazards? Example, U.H. fined by EPA for chemicals and Kulani, branch of U.H., storage facility ten years ago. Big Island just completed school inspections, lot of stuff. A new science teacher has locked up a back room of chemicals, afraid of what is inside. Hawaii LEPC checking into starting

program, unsure of how much cooperation they will have. On Oahu, Fire Department has no jurisdiction in schools. Only State that has no Fire Marshall Program. They have to be invited in. DOE does this annually. Don't cite, they make recommendations for improvement. Discussion Curtis, Henry: Can the HSERC help in getting this issue to state level? HSERC can invite DOE to be member, LEPC can also. Can Planning money be used for this program? One issue is the cost to dispose of chemicals properly; Mr. Peavey's program had volunteers, college students, to do inventory. Example of gathering chemicals from different school together and having one disposal fee. Should it be left alone or can we start doing something. Should contact DOE to establish partnership and determine scope of problem. Discussion with Henry, Beryl, Carter, Curtis. Beryl had done previous cleanup project with schools when she was at Solid and Hazardous Waste Branch (SHWB). New approach to dispensing needed, now there is a green house approach to experiments. Outdated materials should not be in schools, if unsure of chemicals that are considered waste. Eventually, it has to be disposed of. Curtis suggested it may be possible to use money from Solid and Hazardous Waste Branch or from HEER Office to assist. Doing cleanup every 15 to 20 years would still be a problem, need better solution. Clarice will see if it's possible to do a Planning Grant for a program like this that includes cost of disposal and pay for it out of grant funds. There are programs now where SHWB and counties do "Household Hazardous Waste Disposal". DOE and SHWB have done projects before, can we develop program to change the way things are done now. Can planning money be used to have workshops that EPA could attend and bring Mr. Peavey? Tin Shing knows the Oahu Acting Director of School Safety, Mark Behrens. Could also partner with Professional Organizations like ASSC, AIT and others? Could get support from community and professional members to help out on this. Carter has DOE on his LEPC and will bring it up at December 21, meeting. Hope to have discussion to improve ideas. Hopes something will be ready to submit to planning for 2012. Example of inspecting Hilo High School, amount of chemicals was great. Problems with donating chemical, to get rid of them. Mr. Peavey commented that one of the root causes are "No one is making us do anything". When chemicals start disappearing, they don't know where it's going. That is improper disposal. These were all the issues that were talked about. Will report back to HSERC. NASTTPO enlightens us about national issues.

#### 7. HEPCRA Administrative Rules

Governor Lingle signed rules on October 25, 2010; rules went into effect 10 day later on November 5, 2010. Finishing up the handbooks with regulations for the LEPCs. Putting rules on State and Department of Health website. Took over **THREE YEARS** to finish rules.

#### 8. Other Business: Lack of State On Scene Coordinators

8.1 Curtis Martin explained that we have only two SOSCs. One position was eliminated because of State cuts and Mike Cripps retired. His position was frozen, not able to fill at this time. Explained why four (4) SOSC are needed for 24 hour, 7 day week coverage. One SOSC on duty at any time. Keith Kawaoka and Curtis names added to list for contact only. Don't do any of the SOSC's duties. As of January 1, 2011, Keith and Curtis will remove their names to empress the point that there are only two SOSCs. They are available only the first two weeks of the month. LEPCs should make their concerns known to the State about lack of SOSC. Gave example of what happens when Level A event takes place. Training is critical to being an SOSC, not anyone

can do it. Carter gave example of how transfer of responsibly for an event can't be completed until SOSC has responded. Encourage others to submit their concerns to Director of Health. Carter introduced Alex Adams as Fire Department representative. Does not know who next Honolulu LEPC will be

#### FY 2010-2011 HMEP Grant:

#### **Updates:**

1. Follow up to last HSERC meeting on 3 Dec 10, in response to Curtis asking if planning monies can be used for cleanup/disposal of old chemicals.

Response from Charles Rogoff, 23 Feb 11: "The answer is no. It does not fit in to the categories of eligible activities in 49 CFR 110.40. It is also an operational expense which we do not fund."

- Enrollment to the 160-hr Hazmat Tech Level courses on Oahu and Maui is in progress. NFA
  course instructors are John Bowen (Lead) and Doyle Manke. Site location: Oahu Honolulu Fire
  Department; Maui location changed from NG Armory to Maui Fire Department.
- 3. Monies were moved from the planning grant to the training grant to support anticipated reimbursement expenses for Hawaii and Kauai personnel attending training on Oahu and Maui.

-Planning: <u>awarded</u> \$70,100 → change 1 = \$16,824

-Training: awarded \$80,350 → change 1 = \$133,626

<u>Note</u>: It was after this transaction was made that Hawaii County notified Clarice that they were not going to send anyone to the training due to backfill issues. Kauai was given an opportunity to increase their student enrollment and will have a total of 8 students in the Oahu/Maui 160-hr courses.

4. Grant application for 2011-2012 is due on June 1, 2011. The application process begins April 1st and the States will receive notification via email on their tentative planning/training budgets.
Discussion on the upcoming changes to the grant process will be covered at NASTTPO and Clarice will await feedback from Hawaii and Kauai LEPCs!!


