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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHANGES TO RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CONCERNING PATIENTS, THE COUNTY OF KALAWAO, AND THE KALAUPAPA SETTLEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the population of
3	former Hansen's disease patients residing at Kalaupapa in the
4	county of Kalawao is aging. There are currently seven
5	individuals on the Kalaupapa Registry who receive services from
6	the State. Four of them are full-time residents at Kalaupapa.
7	All these patients are age eighty-three years or older.
8	The legislature finds that the county of Kalawao consists
9	of that portion of the island of Molokai commonly known as the
10	Kalaupapa Settlement and that the county of Kalawao is under the
11	jurisdiction and control of the department of health and
12	governed by the laws and rules relating to the department and
13	the care and treatment of persons affected with Hansen's
14	disease. After the passing of the last full- or part-time
15	patient resident at Kalaupapa, the department of health will no
16	longer provide patient care there but intends to complete
17	environmental remediation work.

1	The I	legislature further finds that there are many
2	stakehold	ers that care about the future of the Kalaupapa
3	Settlement	t and the preservation of the historical, cultural, and
4	environme	ntal significance of the county of Kalawao. This Act
5	reflects p	preliminary sentiments heard from some Maui county
6	residents	that the county of Kalawao be reunited with the county
7	of Maui.	A transparent process and opportunity for more
8	extensive	public input regarding the transfer of jurisdiction
9	and contro	ol of Kalawao county is required.
10	Acco	rdingly, the purposes of this Act are to:
11	(1)	Prepare for changes of responsibilities of the
12		department of health upon the passing of the last
13		patient resident of the Kalaupapa Settlement;
14	(2)	Commemorate and preserve the historical, cultural, and
15		environmental significance of the peninsula and its
16		residents in Hawaii's history with the establishment
17		of the Kalaupapa State Historical Area; and
18	(3)	Provide the public the opportunity for input on the
19		future of the county of Kalawao via the legislative
20		process.

1	PART II		
2	SECTION 2. Chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended		
3	by adding to part II a new section to be appropriately		
4	designated and to read as follows:		
5	"§6E- Kalaupapa state historical area. (a) There		
6	shall be a Kalaupapa state historical area that shall consist of		
7	that portion of the island of Molokai known as Kalaupapa,		
8	Kalawao, and Waikolu, and commonly known or designated as the		
9	Kalaupapa Settlement.		
10	(b) The Kalaupapa state historical area is established to		
11	preserve the Kalaupapa Settlement, to educate the public, to		
12	commemorate the lives of residents with Hansen's disease and the		
13	lives of the people who served them, and to recognize the county		
14	of Kalawao and its role in the history of Hawaii."		
15	SECTION 3. Chapter 326, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
16	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
17	and to read as follows:		
18	"§326- County of Kalawao; cessation; county of Maui.		
19	The county of Kalawao that consists of that portion of the		
20	island of Molokai known as Kalaupapa, Kalawao, and Waikolu, and		
21	commonly known or designated as the Kalaupapa Settlement shall		

1 cease to constitute a county by itself and shall be and form a 2 portion of the county of Maui." 3 SECTION 4. Section 326-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended to read as follows: 5 "§326-1 [Establishment of facilities] Services for the 6 treatment and care of persons with Hansen's disease. 7 department of health, subject to the approval of the governor, 8 shall [establish and maintain facilities and] provide services 9 as are necessary for the care and treatment of persons with **10** Hansen's disease and persons who were institutionalized for 11 segregation by order of the department of health because of 12 Hansen's disease. 13 Every [such facility or] service provider shall exercise 14 every reasonable effort to effect a cure of [those] persons[.] 15 with Hansen's disease. All [such] persons with Hansen's disease 16 shall be cared for as well as circumstances will permit, in 17 accordance with accepted medical practices. [Every patient 18 shall be encouraged to take complete treatment so that prompt 19 recovery can be attained. Isolation and treatment shall be 20 compulsory only in those cases where, in the opinion of the 21 department, that treatment is necessary to protect the health of 22 the public, and the department may take such measures as may be

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amended to read as follows:

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1 necessary to enforce this section, including the adoption of 2 rules pursuant to chapter 91.]" 3 SECTION 5. Section 326-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended to read as follows: "§326-13 Expenses; rules. [(a)] The department of health 5 6 shall bear all expenses of travel and other necessary expenses incurred under sections 326-1 to 326-14 and may adopt all rules 7 8 and forms and perform all acts necessary and proper for carrying 9 out their provisions. 10 [(b) Expenses related to patients shall be tracked 11 separately from nonpatient costs, whenever appropriate and 12 possible.]" 13 SECTION 6. Section 326-24, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 14 amended to read as follows: 15 "§326-24 Rules. The director of health may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 necessary for the conduct of all matters 16 17 pertaining to Hansen's disease, the treatment and care thereof, 18 and other services provided to persons affected with Hansen's 19 disease[, and the full and complete governance of the county of 20 Kalawao, except as limited by this chapter]." 21 SECTION 7. Section 326-25.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

12		of Molokai to be selected by the department in
13		consultation with the non-peninsular area of the
14		Molokai community.
15	(b)	Annual reporting shall continue until the earlier of
16	the year	in which the passing of the last patient resident
17	occurs or	Kalaupapa settlement is no longer under the
18	jurisdict	ion and control of the department of health."
19	SECT	ION 8. Section 326-1.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	repealed.	
21	[" [\$	326-1.3] Liberty, autonomy, and dignity of patient
22	residents	. (a) In recognition of the disruptions and hardships

experienced over the course of their lives by former Hansen's 1 2 disease patients residing at Kalaupapa, the legislature declares 3 its intent to ensure that all residents at Kalaupapa are treated 4 with dignity, respect, courtesy, and sensitivity and that the 5 protections extended by this chapter to the patient residents at 6 Kalaupapa are honored and upheld by the department of health to 7 the extent possible within their purview. 8 (b) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the 9 department of health shall promote and protect the personal **10** liberty, autonomy, and dignity of all patient residents at 11 Kalaupapa."] SECTION 9. Section 326-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 13 repealed. 14 ["\\$326-2 Equal treatment of patients. Every Hansen's 15 disease sufferer at Hale Mohalu and Kalaupapa shall be accorded as nearly equal care and privileges as is practicable under the 16 different operating conditions of the two institutions."] 17 18 SECTION 10. Section 326-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 19 repealed. 20 ["§326-11 Voluntary transfer to and from Kalaupapa. Any 21 person undergoing treatment and receiving care for Hansen's 22 disease at Hale Mohalu on June 30, 1969, may be transferred to

1 Kalaupapa for care and treatment if the person desires. Any 2 person who may undergo treatment and receive care for Hansen's 3 disease at Hale Mohalu after June 30, 1969, may apply to the 4 director of health for transfer to Kalaupapa. Any person 5 undergoing treatment and receiving care for Hansen's disease at 6 Kalaupapa may be transferred to Hale Mohalu for care and treatment if the person desires. A person transferred may be 7 8 retransferred to Kalaupapa if the person desires."] 9 SECTION 11. Section 326-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is **10** repealed. 11 ["\footnotesize 326-21 Employment of patients. At any facility for the 12 care and treatment of persons with Hansen's disease, the 13 department of health, with the consent of a patient, may employ 14 that patient to perform labor or service. When there are vacancies in positions, classified under 15 chapter 76, at a facility exclusively for the care and treatment 16 17 of persons with Hansen's disease, employment preference shall be 18 given to temporary release patients and discharged patients from 19 those facilities provided that the persons so hired shall be 20 otherwise qualified under chapter 76. 21 Discharged patients who have been employed prior to 22 December 30, 1960, under chapter 76 in accordance with the

second paragraph of this section shall be eligible to receive 1 2 the same rights and privileges as those enjoyed by temporary 3 release patients employed under the second paragraph of this 4 section."1 5 SECTION 12. Section 326-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 repealed. 7 ["\frac{9326-22}{2} Compensation of patient employees. The 8 compensation for patients employed under section 326-21 shall be 9 set by the department of health; provided that in no case shall 10 the compensation be less than the minimum wage as established by 11 section 387-2. 12 Each patient employee of the department shall be entitled 13 to and granted sick leave with pay and a vacation with pay each 14 calendar year, each calculated at the following rate: 15 For patients working six hours a day, one and one half days for each month of service; 16 For patients working five hours a day, one and one-quarter 17 18 days for each month of service; 19 For patients working four hours a day, one day for each 20 month of service. 21 A month of service is defined as eighty or more hours of 22 work which may be accumulated over any period of time to total

1 eighty hours. No more than twelve months of service may be 2 earned and credited in any calendar year, even if the total 3 number of hours worked should exceed nine hundred sixty hours."] 4 SECTION 13. Section 326-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 repealed. 6 ["\$326-23 Pensions for patient employees at facilities. 7 (a) All patient employees or patient laborers at every facility 8 maintained for the treatment and care of persons with Hansen's 9 disease shall be entitled, upon retirement after twenty years or **10** more service with the department of health, to a pension in an 11 amount which shall be equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent of the monthly wage or salary which the patient was receiving at 12 13 the time of retirement, or to a pension in an amount which shall 14 be equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent of the average 15 monthly wage or salary which the patient employee was receiving during the last twelve months of employment at the department of 16 17 health, whichever is higher. For the period from July 1, 2007, 18 to June 30, 2008, the pension amounts shall be adjusted as 19 follows: 20 (1) Retired patient employees receiving less than \$4,000 21 annually shall be granted a five per cent increase;

1	(2) Retired patient employees receiving \$4,000 or more but
2	less than \$5,000 annually shall be granted a four per
3	cent increase; and
4	(3) Retired patient employees receiving \$5,000 or more
5	annually shall be granted a 2.5 per cent increase.
6	For the period from July 1, 2008, to June 30, 2009, all retired
7	patient employees shall be granted a 2.5 per cent increase.
8	Thereafter, the pension amounts shall remain as adjusted
9	effective for the period ending June 30, 2009.
10	(b) Patient employees may use service with any state
11	department or agency not exceeding five years which has not been
12	credited under the state retirement system in lieu of service
13	with a facility maintained for the treatment and care of persons
14	with Hansen's disease to satisfy the requirements of subsection
15	(a); provided that the service shall be authenticated by
16	official records of the department where service was performed.
17	(c) When work is available at Kalaupapa which may be
18	fulfilled by patient residents of the facility under section
19	326-21 and there are no applicants for those positions from
20	among the eligible patients, pensioned patients who are in
21	residence at Kalaupapa may be reemployed, not to exceed nineteen
22	hours per week, without relinquishing the pension granted to

them under this section. Furthermore, notwithstanding any other 1 2 law relating to this subject, that reemployment shall not result 3 in suspension or termination of payment of the pension granted 4 originally or serve to increase, decrease, or alter the pension 5 in any way."] 6 SECTION 14. Section 326-26, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 repealed: 8 ["\footnotesize 326-26 Persons allowed at places for Hansen's disease 9 patients. (a) No person, not having Hansen's disease, shall be **10** allowed to visit or remain upon any land, place, or inclosure 11 set apart by the department of health for the domiciles and 12 community facilities of persons affected with Hansen's disease, 13 without the written permission of the director of health, or 14 some officer authorized thereto by the department, under any 15 circumstances whatever, and any person found upon such land, place, or inclosure without a written permission shall be fined 16 17 not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 for such offense; provided 18 that any patient resident of Kalaupapa desiring to remain at the 19 facility shall be permitted to do so for as long as the person 20 may choose, regardless of whether the person has been 21 successfully treated.

1 (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), upon the request of a 2 patient, the non-patient-spouse of a patient residing at 3 Kalaupapa shall be allowed to reside with the patient-spouse at 4 Kalaupapa. The non-patient-spouse shall not be entitled to 5 receive any services or benefits accorded specifically to 6 Hansen's disease patients at Kalaupapa."] SECTION 15. Section 326-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 8 repealed. 9 ["\frac{9326-27}{Kalaupapa store; loans for operation and **10** maintenance. (a) All moneys to enable the department of health 11 to operate and maintain the Kalaupapa store, situated in 12 Kalaupapa, Molokai, shall be allocated by the legislature 13 through appropriations out of the state general fund. 14 (b) The department shall include in its budgetary request 15 for each upcoming fiscal period, the amounts necessary to effectuate the purposes of this section. 16 17 (c) All moneys received in reimbursement of payments made 18 under this section shall be deposited to the credit of the state 19 general fund."] 20 SECTION 16. Section 326-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 21 repealed.

1	[" §326-28 Kalaupapa store prices; penalty. It shall be
2	unlawful for the department of health or its agents to sell or
3	offer for sale any merchandise at the Kalaupapa store at prices
4	exceeding the actual cost thereof, free on board steamer or any
5	other means of transportation at Honolulu. Any person violating
6	this section shall be fined \$25 and in addition thereto shall,
7	in the discretion of the department, be subject to removal from
8	office."]
9	SECTION 17. Section 326-29, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	repealed.
11	["\frac{8326-29}{} Fishing laws exemption; Kalaupapa.
12	Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, state laws
13	on fishing shall not be applicable to Hansen's disease patients
14	of Kalaupapa, provided the patients engage in fishing along the
15	shorelines and in waters immediately adjacent to the county of
16	Kalawao.
17	No fish or other marine products obtained by patients may
18	be sold outside of the county of Kalawao.
19	The department of health shall adopt rules pursuant to
20	chapter 91 necessary to control all fishing and acquisition of
21	marine products by Hansen's disease patients."]

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SECTION 18. Section 326-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

2	finds that Hawaii's Hansen's disease victims have in many ways
3	symbolized the plight of those afflicted with this disease
4	throughout the world. Their sufferings and social deprivations
5	helped eventually to bring the story of the disease and an
6	understanding of its health ravages to people everywhere. Those
7	patients who settled in Kalaupapa remain a living memorial to a
8	long history of tragic separation, readjustment, and endurance.
9	It is the policy of the State that the patient residents of
10	Kalaupapa shall be accorded adequate health care and other
11	services for the remainder of their lives. Furthermore, it is
12	the policy of the State that any patient resident of Kalaupapa
13	desiring to remain at the facility shall be permitted to do so
14	for as long as that patient may choose, regardless of whether or
15	not the patient has been successfully treated. A patient
16	resident of Kalaupapa desiring to take leave may do so without
17	loss of financial allowance or coverage of health care costs
18	given those who remain at Kalaupapa."]
19	PART III
20	SECTION 25. Upon the passing of the last full- or part-
21	time patient resident of Kalaupapa, the governor shall issue a
22	proclamation to affirm the date of passing. The governor shall

1	also immediately deliver a copy of the proclamation to the
2	revisor of statutes.
3	For purposes of this Act, "full- or part-time patient
4	resident of Kalaupapa" means a person who was institutionalized
5	for segregation by order of the department of health because of
6	Hansen's disease and who chose to remain at Kalaupapa or Hale
7	Mohalu after June 30, 1969.
8	SECTION 26. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
9	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
10	SECTION 27. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
11	provided that part II of this Act shall take effect on the one-
12	year anniversary of the passing of the last full- or part-time
13	patient resident of Kalaupapa as affirmed in the governor's
14	proclamation, as described in section 25 of this Act.

Description:

Establishes the Kalaupapa State Historical Area. Authorizes the Department of Health to continue providing services statewide to Hansen's disease patients living in the community. Repeals sections of chapter 326, Hawaii Revised Statutes, upon the one-year anniversary of the passing of the last patient resident of Kalaupapa as affirmed in the Governor's proclamation.
