
17th Emergency Proclamation Reduces Quarantine Period

Gov. David Ige has signed a 17th COVID-19 emergency proclamation reducing the state's mandatory self-quarantine period for travelers entering the state and traveling between counties from 14 to 10 days. The new policy took effect today. The change is based on this month's updated recommendations issued by the CDC and the DOH.

"A 10-day self-quarantine period allows us to control the spread of COVID-19 in the community while balancing the need to address the mental and emotional health issues caused by isolation, to improve compliance, and to lessen the economic hardship for those unable to return to work. We will continue to assess the situation and make decisions based on evidence and the advice of our health experts," said Gov. Ige.


In addition, the proclamation extends a moratorium on evictions for renters and lifts the suspension on motor vehicle inspections. The 17th emergency proclamation is in effect until Feb. 14, 2021, which is 60 days from the date of the governor's signature. 36,000 Doses of Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine Expected to Arrive This Month

Director of Health Dr. Elizabeth Char released the following statement following an important committee recommendation that the U.S. Food & Drug Administration grant Emergency Use Authorization for the Moderna mRNA-1273 COVID-19 vaccine:

“Today’s vote will likely lead to the FDA authorizing a second vaccine to help safeguard our community,” said Dr. Char. “It was vitally important for this committee of scientists and clinicians to complete an in-depth review of this vaccine. That review involved a clinical trial of more than 30,000 people. It gives us confidence about the vaccine’s safety and efficacy. Due to its storage requirements, this vaccine is easier to ship and store than the vaccine already in use.”

Today’s news follows the arrival of additional doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, which were distributed to healthcare facilities across O’ahu to be shared with their network of facilities including those on the neighbor islands. Together, more than 81,000 doses of both vaccines are expected to arrive in Hawai'i in December. Key Updates: Clusters Involving Social Gatherings

- **Substantial COVID-19 transmission can result from even small social gatherings, especially when masks are removed to eat and drink.** One cluster involving a friend group that frequently gathered for small social activities resulted in a total of 19 cases. Transmission appears to have occurred during at least three small gatherings in mid-November, including multiple beach gatherings and a backyard barbeque. In the case of the backyard barbeque, one attendee, who was asymptomatic, got tested for COVID-19 a few days following the event. Although that individual immediately notified the other three attendees, the information was received after the exposed individuals had attended other social events, worked, and had close contact with their household members, family, and close friends. Transmission in all of the social gatherings involved in this cluster was primarily observed among individuals **eating and drinking together in group social settings.**
- Attendees of a small birthday party in October became a COVID-19 cluster when all 7 later tested positive. Although attendees reported engaging in some preventive measures at the gathering, they also reported **frequently removing masks to eat and drink.** At one point the entire group crowded around a computer screen for an extended period of time to talk to someone who was participating via Zoom. Two attendees were hospitalized for COVID-19 related illness.
- One cluster traced to group of **teenagers socializing in a forested recreational area** shows the risk of riding together in the same car. One of the teens had recently returned from the mainland United States and was symptomatic during the gathering. Two other teens present for the outdoors excursion subsequently tested positive for COVID-19, as did one close contact that had not been present.

Introduction to the State of Hawai'i Weekly COVID-19 Cluster Report

A disease cluster refers to multiple cases of a disease occurring at one time, in one geographic location, or among people with the same or similar shared exposures. Public health officials investigate and study disease clusters because they can provide important information about how diseases are transmitted between individuals and among groups of people; information which can then be used to identify risk factors, inform official recommendations, design interventions, and implement policies to prevent, mitigate, and stop the spread of that disease in communities.

In Hawai'i, COVID-19 clusters associated with community events, social gatherings, workplaces, and other settings have helped public health officials understand the specific settings where disease transmission is most likely to occur. As our state looks to modify current restrictions on businesses and activities implemented in response to the global COVID-19 pandemic, the Hawai'i State Department of Health is prioritizing not only investigating and analyzing local COVID-19 clusters, but also sharing current cluster information and disseminating key lessons learned to date.

It is important to note that most COVID-19 cases cannot be linked to a specific setting or cluster. Therefore, the total number of cases identified as associated with COVID-19 clusters in Hawai'i will be significantly lower than the overall total number of cases of COVID-19 identified within the State of Hawai'i. Department of Public Safety:
Inmate and Staff Testing Continues

Surge testing of inmates and staff at facilities statewide is ongoing. Halawa Correctional Facility reports two (2) more positive staff cases. The active positive staff count is now 35 and the active positive inmate count remains unchanged at 177. The Waiawa Correctional Facility reports nine (9) inmate recoveries, lowering the total active positive inmate cases to 11, including two (2) in the hospital. The O'ahu Community Correctional Center (OCCC) reported nine (9) negative inmate test results and one (1) negative staff result. There are only three (3) active positive inmates at OCCC. 
