TOPIC	DISCUSSION	ACTION		
Call to Order	The meeting was called to order at 1:01 p.m. by Robert Hirokawa, Chairperson, Health Data Advisory Council (HDAC) presiding.			
Roll Call	Member roll call.

State Health Planning and Development Agency	J. Lewin, Administrator, SHPDA, provided the following updates:			
(SHPDA)	1. Legislative Activity & Prior Authorization (PA): J. Lewin apologized for the delay in meetings, attributing it to intense legislative activity. He highlighted the passage of House Bill 250, which mandates health insurers in Hawaii to report all prior authorization (PA) related data to SHPDA. This includes denied claims, challenged denied claims, and reversed challenged claims. Data collection will begin later this year and continue annually until the PA issue is resolved. This initiative places Hawaii at the forefront of a national issue regarding PA, aiming to address it as a significant consumer problem.			
	2. Prior Authorization Working Group: The bill also establishes a working group comprising insurers, hospitals, physicians, providers, the Insurance Commissioner, and the Department of Health to propose solutions for prior authorization in Hawaii. The goal is to automate the process to alleviate the burden on healthcare providers and patients. Dr. Lewin emphasized the need for input from the committee's health information leadership.			
	3. Funding for Rural Health Clinics (EPIC Implementation): A proposal for over \$20 million to help rural health clinics and providers adopt EPIC or EPIC-compatible services was discussed. Despite strong support and no opposition through various committees, the Finance Committee ultimately blocked the bill. The intent was to improve care coordination, data exchange, and quality of care, as 80% of Hawaii's providers already use EPIC. SHPDA plans to reintroduce this initiative next year.			

- 4. All-Payer Claims Database (APCD): The APCD is moving forward, with an expected go-live date in summer 2026. Testing with "AHEAD" (All-Payer Health Effienciency Approaches and Development) is planned for next summer. This database will enable the state to generate crucial reports on health outcomes (e.g., cancer, heart disease) and identify gaps in care.
- 5. AHEAD Grant (All-Payer Health Equity Approaches and Development):
 - a. This is a significant grant that has survived cuts. The "equity" component has been refocused to "efficiency."
 - b. SHPDA has requested a delay in some grant requirements, including hospital global budgets, potentially pushing the deadline to January 2028 due to recent legislative changes (HR 1 bill). This delay provides more flexibility for implementation.
 - c. The new administration has introduced "chomp" (choice and competition) elements, requiring states to select at least one choice and one competition item from a provided menu. This has caused some annoyance among states already progressing with their plans, but SHPDA's decision to delay finalizing the state agreement until the last moment is beneficial, allowing for thorough data analysis with hospitals.
 - d. The grant includes ten different incentive programs. SHPDA plans to work closely with individual hospitals to provide precise data on the financial impact of participation before they commit.
- 6. Impact of HR 1 (Affordable Care Act Changes):
 - a. The HR 1 bill could lead to a significant financial hit to Hawaii's Medicaid program, estimated at a minimum of \$100 million annually. Initially, projections were as high as \$300 million.
 - b. A provision that would have changed the State-Federal Medicaid match (FMAP) for new Affordable Care Act enrollees from 90/10 to Hawaii's standard 60/40 was removed due to legal challenges, which is positive for Hawaii.
 - c. MedQuest's 1115 waiver, secured before the previous presidential election, remains intact.
 - d. Subsidies for health exchanges have been stripped, potentially making insurance unaffordable for approximately half of the 26,000 people currently on the exchange in Hawaii. This is expected to increase the number of uninsured individuals, necessitating a redo of previous uninsured reports.
 - e. These changes will begin implementation in one year, and the committee's help will be needed to analyze the impact.

- 7. Rural Health Funding Opportunity: HR 1 includes a \$50 billion allocation (\$10 billion annually from 2026-2030) to offset damage to rural health areas caused by the bill's cuts.
 - a. \$25 billion will be awarded equally to states, meaning Hawaii will receive the same amount as larger states like New York or California, totaling \$100 million. This money needs to be spent and administered wisely with measurable success.
 - b. The remaining \$25 billion is at the discretion of the CMS administrator (Dr. Oz, referred to as "the Wizard"). Dr. Lewin believes presenting brilliant ideas could secure a larger share for Hawaii, significantly offsetting the bill's negative impacts.
- 8. SHPDA Staffing: SHPDA is hiring two new positions with AHEAD grant money. Paula Doan has been hired as secretary, and Barbara Yamashita has joined as a SHPDA, filling in for Wendy's previous role. Recruitment is ongoing for Wendy's position.

Key Initiatives and Requests for The Health Data Council Members:

- 1. AHEAD Grant Implementation: SHPDA is preparing six large procurements to implement the AHEAD grant, focusing on primary care and hospital global budgets.
- 2. Innovating Kupuna Care: SHPDA is developing a program called KupunaAloha to help Medicare-eligible Kupuna (elders) age at home, as Medicare does not cover non-medical home health services (e.g., chore services, transportation). This program will likely utilize trained volunteers and telemedicine to extend the reach of limited healthcare professionals, aiming to reduce emergency room visits and hospital admissions.
- 3. Increasing Primary Care Funding: The goal is to increase primary care funding from an estimated 6% of current spend to 12% under the AHEAD grant. This is expected to reduce unnecessary ER and hospitalization use and improve population health but requires active participation from payers.
- 4. Estimating Uninsured Keiki: The Legislature has specifically asked this group to estimate the number of uninsured Keiki (children) aged 0-18, particularly in East Hawaii and Maui. The current estimate is around 20,000 uninsured children statewide. This data is crucial to justify funding for a program that guarantees health insurance for every child.
 - J. Lewin appealed for assistance, particularly from Deb and Haley, to crunch these numbers, acknowledging that the APCD is not yet

	operational. Currently, any eligible children might not be enrolled in MedQuest due to lack of awareness or application.

Subgroup Formation or Permitted Interaction Group (PIG)	Laulima Data Alliance (Laulima): H. Hsieh presented an overview of the Keiki Universal Coverage Initiative (HR34) Attached.	
	Chair Hirokawa called for a motion made to form a second PIG to estimate the number of characteristics of uninsured children in Hawaii., D. Taira made the motion, F. Chan seconded the motion. Vote: Unanimous. Motion carried.




