<p>Training Description and Core Clinical Components:</p>	<p>The purpose of the training is to introduce participants to the presentation of trauma among clients and the relation between traumatic experience and the development of substance use disorders. Key topics include: an overview of trauma presentations across the lifespan; socioecological conceptualizations of early childhood trauma leading to later life judicial and medical impairments; and skills and strategies to intervene with clients who have co-occurring trauma and substance use disorders.</p>
<p>Learning Objectives:</p>	<p>At the conclusion of the training, participants will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Compare two (2) differences between “Big T” and “little t” stressors. 2. Explain two (2) of the major findings from the ACE study relating to childhood experience to substance use and adult health impairment. 3. Integrate two (2) components into practice of trauma-informed engagement of clients. 4. Specify three (3) cognitive or physiological impacts of trauma on functioning. 5. Design at least one (1) organizational enhancement of Trauma-Informed Care.
